

BUSINESS WOMEN LEAVE FOR STATE FEDERATION MEET

A delegation of local business and professional women left Medford this noon for Eugene, to attend the annual convention of the state federation, which opened at 3 o'clock this afternoon and will close Sunday afternoon.

The local members will arrive in the northbound train for the executive reception to be held this evening. There they will be presented to Mrs. J. K. Bowman, first vice-president of the national federation, who has come all the way from her home in Richmond, Va., to attend the conference. Mrs. Bowman has been elected national speaker to eight state conventions to be held this year.

Each local club attending the convention will present a stunt dramatizing the life of some woman character of historic note who lived within their own locality. The Medford group will give a sketch from the life of Mary Ann Harris, Jackson county heroine, who, in 1855, held a band of 20 Indians at bay and saved her own life and that of her daughter.

Miss Agnes Daugherty will portray the life of the historic character in pantomime at the end of the sketch, wearing a reproduction of a dress worn by Mary Ann Harris at the time of the notable event. Others in the local stunt will be Maude Chapman and Leta Thompson.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 24.—(AP)—Dr. Clelland B. McAfee of Chicago was elected moderator of the 141st general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States of America here today. He defeated Dr. Robert Dick Wilson of the faculty of Princeton Theological seminary, Princeton, N. J.

Dr. McAfee, a professor of the Presbyterian Theological seminary, Chicago, formerly of the McCormick seminary, occupied 37 years after he came to St. Paul for his honeymoon. Dr. McAfee was nominated by Dr. Josiah Sibley of Pasadena, Cal. The nomination was seconded by Frank J. Loesch, Chicago attorney, who was recently appointed to President Hoover's crime commission. The assembly roused with laughter when Loesch, an elder in the church, declared "if there is any place in the world that needs a moderator at this time, it's Chicago."

LITHUANIAN ASSASSIN IMPLICATES FRIENDS

KOVNO, Lithuania, May 24.—(AP) A student named Vosylius, sentenced to death yesterday for the recent attempt on the life of Premier Waldemar, was executed by a firing squad at sunrise today.

His sentence he confessed a share in the crime and implicated certain of his friends as accomplices, among them a student named Gudeitis who he alleged was the prime mover in the plot. The premier and Mme. Waldemar escaped injury when a fusillade of shots fired at them struck four of their party as they were entering a theatre.
