

# NEW LICENSE TO HOUSE TO VOTE POOL PLACES IF ON TARIFF BILL BEHAVIOR GOOD NEXT TUESDAY

### Mayor Favors Clamping Lid On Any Place Reported As Violating Law — No Hurry About Reopening Closed Places Raided.

The council license committee having finished its investigation work of all the card and pool rooms of the city, which all will be required to give up their old licenses and bonds, and take out new ones under the new city ordinance with the clause reading that their conviction at any time for selling intoxicating liquor shall constitute cause for the revoking of such license, it remains for the mayor to call the council into a special session to grant such licenses as that body approves.

It is understood that the council license committee will recommend that all the pool and card rooms be given licenses, including the three whose licenses were revoked over a week ago, on the promise of all to conform with the state, federal and municipal laws governing their businesses.

However, Mayor Pipes is not in a hurry to call this special session and will take his time in doing so, but when he does call it he will advocate a drastic regulation before all card and pool rooms are granted new licenses, which he looks for the council to unanimously approve, and which is to insure the conduct of such establishments in the future, no matter if evidence of wrong doing can not be legally obtained.

This proposed regulation of the mayor's is that every card and pool room owner be given to understand that when he accepts the new license, it may be revoked at the will of the council at any time thereafter on reports reaching that body that gambling, sale of liquor or any other suspected wrong doing is being permitted.

### WOOD CUTTERS CAUSE SMALL FOREST FIRE

A small forest fire on state land was started yesterday about seven miles this side of Butte Falls among the tree-tops and brush. Several boys were cutting wood, and one of them had lighted a campfire to warm themselves by, and then the fire was not properly extinguished, so that when a breeze started up the smoldering fire flared up and spread so fast that one-eighth of an acre had been burned over before it was extinguished. Dwight Phipps, district state fire warden, drove to the scene yesterday to investigate.

The forest fire which started the other day on logged-off and brush land a mile and one-half below Trail on the west side of the river, is under control after having burned over about 25 acres, instead of 50 acres as was first reported. The origin of this fire is still a mystery, beyond the fact that it was man-made.

## OLDEST OREGON NATIVE BURIED IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24.—(P)—Funeral services were held here today for David A. Carter, 87, said to be the oldest white native of the Oregon territory. He died Wednesday, Mr. Carter was born March 19, 1842, on the old Methodist Mission farm at Wheatland, not far distant from Salem. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. David Carter, members of the party which the Rev. Jason Lee brought to Oregon in 1840.

The father was first in charge of the mission at The Dalles, and a year later took charge of the mission farm. Mr. Carter was born the spring Dr. John McLoughlin founded Oregon City.

## FATAL ACCIDENTS ON INCREASE IN U. S.

CHICAGO, May 24.—(P)—Accidents killed 96,000 persons in the United States in 1928, the national safety council announced today. This was an increase of 3.1 per cent over 1927. Of the total number of deaths 27,500 were attributed to automobiles and 368 to civil aviation. Railroad accidents, the report said, are on the wane.

## Bogus "Duke of Sutherland" Had Winning Manner With Tradesmen; Now He's in St. Petersburg Jail

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., May 24.—(P)—Life had atken on a rosy hue for "Dr. Charles Emerson Sargent Maitland," know also as the "Duke of Sutherland" until tradesmen inquired into a little matter of \$375,000 they estimated he owed for furnishings in his gorgeously appointed Small Isle apartment.

The doctor today was in the city jail, after apparently having solved the age-old problem of getting something for nothing. The charge against him was obtaining money under false pretenses, but the doctor kept up his spirits and maintained that "everything would come out all right."

Maitland presented himself to local tradesmen as the head surgeon of eight European and California hospitals. He claimed also to be a member of the British aristocracy, the duke, in fact, of Sutherland. At psychological moments, during his shopping expeditions for art objects, oriental rugs, diamonds and ingots, he mentioned casually that his bank deposits in this country alone totalled \$10,000,000.

W. L. Hardin, the business manager, however, wired police that Maitland had obtained various sums of money from him under pretense that he was heir to a vast estate, and last night Maitland went to jail.
