Ted Lyons went the route against Detroit and George Uhle pitched 20 of the 21 innings. The veteran Detroit right hander gave way to a pinch runner in the 21st inning, but retained credit for the victory, his eighth in succession this season. Lil Stoner finished for him.

The game was three rounds short of the American league record and five below the memorable draw played by the Braves and four contests ever went longer by cuffling the Senators, 10 to 3, at Shibe park. Fox, Simmons and Cochran went on a home run spree after Cronin had hit one out of the lot for the Senators.

The Red Sox helped the Mackinac cause by whitewashing the Yankees, 5 to 0, at the Fenway. Danny MacFadden gave the champions just four hits and never was in danger.
