SOUTHERN OREGON SHOULD UNITE ON ALL AROUND DEVELOPMENT OF TOURIST TRAVEL

THE more good roads to Crater Lake, the greater the tourist travel, and the greater the tourist travel, the greater the benefits to Southern Oregon, each section of which will share in the increased revenue.

Those districts which oppose the Tiller-Trail cut-off to Crater Lake, because they are not on it, are, to our mind, guilty of both a selfish and short-sighted policy.

ROSEBURG, Tiller, Trail, Eagle Point, and the intervening territory, would benefit more directly than Medford by the construction of this proposed cut-off.

An overwhelming proportion of the tourists from the north who would take this cut-off to Crater Lake would return via Medford, Central Point and Grants Pass.

Instead of opposing new feeders, new lines of communication, new routes which will open up new areas of scenic and recreational attractions in this part of the country, all that are justified on this basis, should be universally supported.

FOR, we repeat, anything that will increase the total volume of tourist travel to Southern Oregon is good for Southern Oregon,—for every town and trading center in it.

What applies to Crater Lake applies to the Oregon Caves. The proposed Williams Creek construction, for example, would not only benefit Medford and Williams Creek, but Grants Pass and all the intervening territory.

Let's get together on this tourist business, not fight among ourselves. This would not only be a nicer spirit, but one that would pay each district in this part of the state more revenue in dollars and cents.

THE S. P. AND ITS BLUE CARDS

WE see no cause for surprise over the fact that some Medford business men signed blue cards, which directly approved of the Southern Pacific and indirectly opposed the proposed extension of the Great Northern.

Where any railroad enjoys a monopoly, it also enjoys a coercive power of which—when competition threatens,—it never fails to take advantage.

No matter how strong public sentiment may be in favor of a new railroad, there are always large shippers who can't afford to antagonize the old one.

NINETY per cent of the people of Southern Oregon want the Hill lines hooked up in this part of the coast, not because they have any particular hostility toward the Southern Pacific; but because they believe a competing line opening up new territory and bringing in new blood will be of tremendous material benefit to this part of the state.

No one can blame the S. P. for retaining its monopoly if it can. But these blue cards will not be a serious factor in the decision which will finally determine it.
