NO CAUSE FOR UNDUE ALARM OVER FLY PEST

"While every effort should and will be made to prevent any possible invasion of the Mediterranean fruit fly into Oregon," said Lyle Wilcox, county agent today, "I do not think there is any value in scare-head items regarding the danger or any justification for some of the alarming fears expressed to me by agitated individuals."

"The government is attacking the danger at its source and the states are co-operating. According to my information, the pest cannot flourish in the temperate zone, but is practically confined to regions where the temperature in April and May does not get below 40 to 45 degrees. As to the report the fly flourishes in France in the vicinity of Paris, I have found nothing in the scientific records to verify this. If this is correct, of course the statements of the entomologists are not correct."

"California has declared an embargo at its borders, and in semi-tropical southern California this season is necessary. Oregon has not yet established inspectors at the state line, but this may be found necessary if the danger spreads."

"My idea is that everything possible should be done to protect the fruit growers of Oregon, but I see no profit to be gained in becoming hysterical over the situation at this present time. It is better to keep the fruit industry rather than benefit it."

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POULTRY DISEASE CURE BY VACCINE

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 28.—(Special)—Chicken pox, one of the major diseases of poultry frequently reported to cause heavy losses, has yielded to scientific investigation but may now be controlled cheaply and with comparative ease on any poultry farm. Discovery of a new vaccine positive in action and simple and safe in application is announced here by the veterinary medicine department where Dr. W. T. Johnson, the three years' successful experimenter, has completed a part of his research under the terms of the state appropriation for poultry disease investigation.

"As we see it, low losses from chicken pox can be entirely eliminated," said Dr. T. B. Simms, head of the veterinary department. "To this end we are advocating vaccination of all flocks on farms where pox has previously existed."

PLANS OF HANGAR GET APPROVAL BY PORT COMMITTEE

Tentative plans for the first hangar unit at the Medford airport, have been passed by the airport committee and Frank C. Clark, architect, is rushing plans and compiling estimates of cost on the structure. As soon as this work is completed and final approval is given construction work will start. Present plans call for the erection of a hangar 110 feet long and 100 feet wide, with an entrance of that width.

On one side will be built quarters for the Boeing Airplane company, which has temporarily abandoned its plans for the erection of an administration building. It will include a waiting room, superintendent's office, general office and rest rooms. The city will secure rental from these quarters.

The remaining space will be used for shops, pilots' rooms and storage.

On the other side space will be provided for concessions, and the second story will be used for the weather observatory and radio work. Also the hangar will be a station for use of the weather man in casting loose his balloons for wind and weather observations.

No decision has been reached on the LaMella roofing for the hangar. This roofing goes away with the use of rods and trusses.
