

WANDERER FOUND IN SISKIYOU BY TELEPHONE CREW

A homeless wanderer about 50 years of age, was found late yesterday afternoon in Bear Cat canyon, in the Siskiyou mountains, near the California-Oregon state line, by a crew of men engaged in clearing a right-of-way for a phone line.

The rescuers tried to walk the wanderer to the Pacific highway, but he was too weak to climb the steep grade. They then made a litter from their mackinaws, and packed him to a nearby cabin.

Foreman Cummings phoned the information to Ray Satchwell, general manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company here. Sheriff Jennings left this morning to investigate the case and bring the unfortunate man to this city.

The lost man, from his own meager details of his mishap, is thought to have been a "hitch-hiker" along the Pacific highway. The country in which he was lost is wild and impenetrable, and has few trails.

SUMMER SCHOOL TO OPEN JUNE 10 AT JUNIOR HIGH

The third annual summer school of the Medford city system will open June 10, for a six weeks' term, under the direction of Charles Glen Smith who has directed the work of these sessions for the past two years.

The school is designed to accommodate all grades from first to 12th. Sessions will be held in the junior high school building from 8:00 a. m. until 12:00 m. daily.

The objects of the school, according to Superintendent Hedrick, are largely remedial and make-up work for pupils who have had difficulty in the regular sessions because of laziness or other reasons. At the close of the regular year each teacher for any subject or grade, must file a detailed report of every pupil under her charge, who has failed in one or more subjects.

In rare cases, high school pupils of exceptional ability are given permission to do a semester's work in a new subject, such as English, history, civics or mathematics, but this is not encouraged as it is felt that the time is too short to do justice to such an amount of new work.

There is little formal class work; the school is organized on the individual method plan, and every effort is made to give each pupil the special coaching and help he most needs.

Usually from 90 to 100 pupils attend the summer sessions and are able to make up their subjects to such an extent that they avoid having to repeat the grade in regular year, thus saving themselves much time, and the district the expense of keeping them another half year in school. All pupils who desire to take summer work must register for the courses they desire to take on or before Saturday, June 7. Pupils may register with Mrs. Esther Feigel at the Junior high school or Charles Glen Smith at the senior high school. A tuition fee of \$7.50 for the six weeks is charged each pupil to help defray the cost of the school. This is due in advance and should be paid to Charles Glen Smith Monday morning, June 10.

Registration of pupils should not be completed until the failure report is had from the pupil's regular teacher. Pupils not financially able to pay tuition or furnish books, yet who need the summer work, should see the city school superintendent, third floor, Medford building.

CHAMBER BOARD AIDS MOVE FOR FLY INSPECTION

A rigid inspection of Florida fruits and vegetables entering Oregon is favored in a resolution introduced as a protective measure against the Mediterranean fly at the board of directors' meeting of the Medford chamber of commerce last night.

The resolution was introduced following its passage yesterday by the board of directors of the Jackson County Fruit-growers' league.

It is the purpose of the resolution to seek the aid of the state to enforce an inspection of fruit entering Oregon from Florida and other states. A similar resolution has also been passed by the Hood River growers. Reports that the fly had been discovered in California have caused local fruit interests to become especially interested in the pest.

Committee reports were also heard at last night's session. J. W. Wakefield of the roads committee reported the Williams creek road project will be taken up at a meeting in a short time. A. A. Hayden of the publicity committee told of the Jackson county exhibition sent to Los Angeles for exhibition and said it would arrive there in time for the Shrine convention to be held there next week.

The chamber membership is also to be increased, according to a report by Jack Thompson of the membership committee.

W. S. Bolger of the forum committee told of plans for the next forum, explaining it will be an open meeting, with the chairman of all committees present to outline plans for the ensuing year. This forum will be held the middle of next month.

MUIRHEAD MAKES INITIAL LANDING ON NEW AIRPORT

That Medford's new airport has already been christened became known today when Mayor Pipes was informed that several days ago Moose Muirhead, the local amateur pilot, made a landing there in the evening and also a take off. Although most of the field was plowed and little of it had been rolled, Moose made an easy arrival and getaway.

That the field will be, officially tested in a few days by a test airplane landing was announced by the mayor today. Work has progressed rapidly the past few days, under the direction of Fred Scheffel, and with seven tractors working 15 hours per day, the long runway is as level as a race track.

Although it will be September before the airport is entirely completed it is now planned to use the field for airplane landing in June when the newspaper airplane caravan from the northwest is scheduled to arrive, en route south. Although the work of draining the field will then be in progress, local aviation experts declare landing will be perfectly safe and continue so throughout the summer.

Today Fred Scheffel sold the timber taken from the airport property to the Tomlin Bay company at a good profit to the city. Thus far it is estimated the Pipes "efficiency system" has saved the city five or six thousand dollars over the original estimates of construction costs.
