An increase in allotments for federal cooperation with states in forest fire control of \$11,234 for Washington and \$18,565 for Oregon is announced by the forest service office at Portland. These increases, which bring the amounts up to \$90,389 in Washington and \$83,575 in Oregon, are made possible by an increase of \$200,000 in the total congressional appropriation for all states carried by the last agricultural appropriation. The total now stands at \$1,400,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1.
