

WINTER REIGNS WITH BIG SNOW AT CRATER RIM

Freeze Halts Snow Melting—Water Pipes Frozen—Caterpillar Unable Work Rim Road—Beetle Work Continues Despite Cold.

While much needed showers were falling here last night to the extent of .03 of an inch, and today it was snowing hard at Crater Lake National park, and the outlook was for probable showers tonight and Saturday.

Winter is again reigning at the national park, where up to a week ago when the chilly weather spell set in the deep snow was melting so fast that it was then thought that it continued without much interruption the park entrance roads would clear themselves of snow by July 1, when the season opens.

However, this outlook has totally changed since, at least temporarily, for there is six feet of hard-packed and frozen snow at the lake rim, three feet of it at Anna Spring camp, and 30 feet at Watchman peak on the rim road. The temperature has been very cold nights and mornings lately. Only a few days ago the morning minimum was 29 degrees above, which froze up the water pipes and did other damage at the park.

So hard is the snow now frozen that yesterday Superintendent E. C. Solinsky, who returned to the city yesterday, with a crew was able to go over it in a large caterpillar on the various roads and around the rim a ways until the 30-foot depth at Watchman

peak was encountered, the large tractor sinking down only a little over an inch in most places.

It had been Mr. Solinsky's plan to open the rim road around the lake as early in the season as was possible, probably earlier than it had been opened to travel for years past, and as a means to this end to have the frozen snow mass on the rim road loosened up here and there with shots of powerful explosives, and then letting nature do the rest with the natural thawing process.

This plan is knocked in the head, at least temporarily, by the great mass of snow at Watchman peak, always the worst point on the rim road, which now prevents the caterpillar getting to it with supplies.

The present outlook is that unless practically continuous very warm weather prevails from now on, there will have to be much shoveling work done, following loosening of blasts of explosives, to get the roads opened up through the park by July 1.

However, the frozen ice masses in the park are not interfering with the pine beetle destroying work there because the large crews of workers engaged in this campaign easily walk over it.

YOUTH INJURED IN HIGHWAY ACCIDENT REGAINS STRENGTH

The condition of William Reed, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Reed, who has been in the Sacred Heart hospital since Tuesday as a result of injuries sustained when his motorcycle collided on the Pacific highway, Sunday, with a car driven by Dr. McKay, woman physician of Grants Pass, is reported greatly improved.

The local boy, who was just recovering from an appendicitis operation performed three weeks ago, when the accident occurred, was more seriously injured than it was first thought. His left leg was broken, the fractured bone piercing the artery and causing not only a tremendous loss of blood, but resulting in infection. The other leg was badly cut and bruised and also became infected. A careful diagnosis at the local hospital did not disclose any serious internal injuries.

Upon receiving the news of her son's accident, Mrs. Reed left Medford immediately with Mrs. Laura Putnam, a trained nurse, Sunday night. The boy, in the meantime, was moved 40 miles into Grants Pass, Tuesday morning he was placed on a cot and in the baggage car of the southbound Southern Pacific and brought to Medford. Here he was met by the Peri ambulance and removed to the local hospital.
