NEW LAWS EFFECTIVE JUNE 4TH

Enactments of 1929 Legislature Total 427—Many Important Measures Effective Later or in Litigation—Voter Qualification, Judge Salary Among New Measures.

SALEM, Ore., May 31.—(P)—All new laws enacted by the 1929 Oregon legislature will become effective next Tuesday, except those carrying the emergency clause and those providing some other effective date. A compilation prepared by the secretary of state shows a total of 427 new acts. This total, however, includes nearly 750 acts repealing obsolete legislation.

Among the most important of these are the taxation measures, an act changing from January 1 to July 1 the date for changing motor vehicle licenses, and an act reducing motor vehicle licenses by about 25 per cent, both effective in 1930; the measure consolidating into one board the boards of regents of state institutions of higher learning and an act creating two new circuit judgeships in Multnomah county.

Among the taxation measures are three revenue acts effective in 1930. These are the income, the excise and the intangibles tax acts. The referendum has been invoked against the two former. Petitions have been completed in the income tax referendum but in the excise referendum they are held up by litigation challenging the attorney general's ballot title, and may not be completed by June 4, the final date on which they may be filed. The bill giving Multnomah county two more circuit judges is also being subjected to the referendum, and the education board is under attack in the courts on the question of constitutionality. This measure is to take full effect July 1 by special provision of the bill, except that for the first two years the board would allocate no funds appropriated for the several institutions. After that it is given full authority to distribute the funds among the institutions as it sees fit.

Effective Tuesday
Among the measures becoming effective next Tuesday the following are of more than ordinary importance:
Providing for alternate jurors to prevent mistrials in event of inability or death of regular juror.
Placing maritime workers under workmen's compensation act.
Abolishing court of domestic relations in Multnomah county and making judge of that court a circuit judge.
Making property ownership qualification for voting on bond issues and special tax levies in the state or its political subdivisions.
Authorizing prohibition, traffic or any other state officers to make arrests for livestock thefts.
Taking limit off number of traffic officers.
Increasing salaries of circuit judges.
Providing for licensing of meat dealers and stamping of meats as protection against cattle rustling.
Providing of from \$200 to \$500 and penitentiary sentence of from one to five years for second offense of driving motor vehicle while intoxicated.
Two acts providing for appointive salaried tax commission and statewide control of assessments by this commission.
Reforestation act.
A measure placing on the state corporation department the regulation of corporations owning or controlling majority of any bank stock, and directed at unincorporations, is not effective until January 1, next.
