"You may never have heard of Beagle. It sounds no feature to name. But in those parts the streams are many, and each of them is hill-born, as is Jim. And in that region the deer are numerous even in off-years, and you have but to thrust into the wild Haac, along the water courses, to waken the thunder of a rising geyser. Such is the broad domain from which Jim Dinkens has lately descended, to replenish his bacon and to have speech with constituted authority. For the deer are in his crops again, and the cheerful patience of Jim Dinkens is already tried. The deer are in his crops. "There is no alfalfa like the forage they grow in the hill country, down southern Oregon way—not anywhere else. In a single night the corn springs tall, as though it had been conjured from the ground. Set your teeth to a radish, and it lurge as any crab-apple, to hear it fracture crisply and to have it melt in your mouth as it were snow. So it is with all garden truck in those parts, where the clearings have been won from the forest, and the cedars and sugar pines crowd close. Through such fields as these, in that favored land inhabited only by Jim Dinkens and a few others, wanders the sprightly deer. Small wonder that Jim complains of their forays, when all his nights are punctured by the click of cloven hooves passing lightly over the top rail from the forest to his fields. "With all this, however, one is but idly concerned. It constitutes an issue that rests between the hillman and the warden, and of which satisfactory disposition doubtless shall be made. But the tales of wonder that Mr. Dinkens brings down from his mountainous perch—touch us to the heart's core, and quicken there something we had thought to be sleeping, a discontent with towns and cities.

THREE QUARTER AUTO FEE AFTER JUNE 4TH. SALEM, Ore., June 1.—(Special).—Motor vehicle owners who have been uncertain whether to buy automobile licenses during June and pay the full year's fee, or wait until July and pay only a half fee, are aided by an opinion from Attorney General Van Winkle that has just been received by Secretary of State Hood. The 1929 legislature passed a quarter-year license fee law, and Van Winkle holds that it is applicable after new laws go into effect June 4. This means that owners who wish to get their licenses before July may get them for three-fourths of the full year's fee. There was doubt as to whether the legislature intended this new law should go into effect this year.

GAS CORPORATION SPENDS BIG SUM IMPROVE SERVICE

One year ago today the Southern Oregon Gas corporation took over the property of the Southern Oregon Gas company and K. L. Darcy, formerly of San Francisco, became the general manager of the branches at Grants Pass, Roseburg, Ashland and Medford. During the past year over \$50,000 has been spent in improvements by the gas corporation. The business of the organization has increased 40 per cent and southern Oregon cooking rates have been reduced. "It is the purpose of the southern Oregon Gas corporation to bring the gas industry in southern Oregon to the same point of importance, which it occupies in the more thickly settled centers of population. In the larger cities 60 per cent of cooking is done by gas," Mr. Darcy said in discussing his business. Day and night service is given to consumers of gas and owners of products sold by the gas corporation. Gas ranges, hot water heaters, refrigerators and house and office heating systems are included in the gas products on sale at each of the four stores. "Previous to coming to Medford in order to take over the management of the Southern Oregon Gas corporation, Mr. Darcy was connected with the Pacific Gas and Electric company in San Francisco. It is the present plan of the organization to continue improving the service to patrons and build up the business in every possible way, the manager stated.
