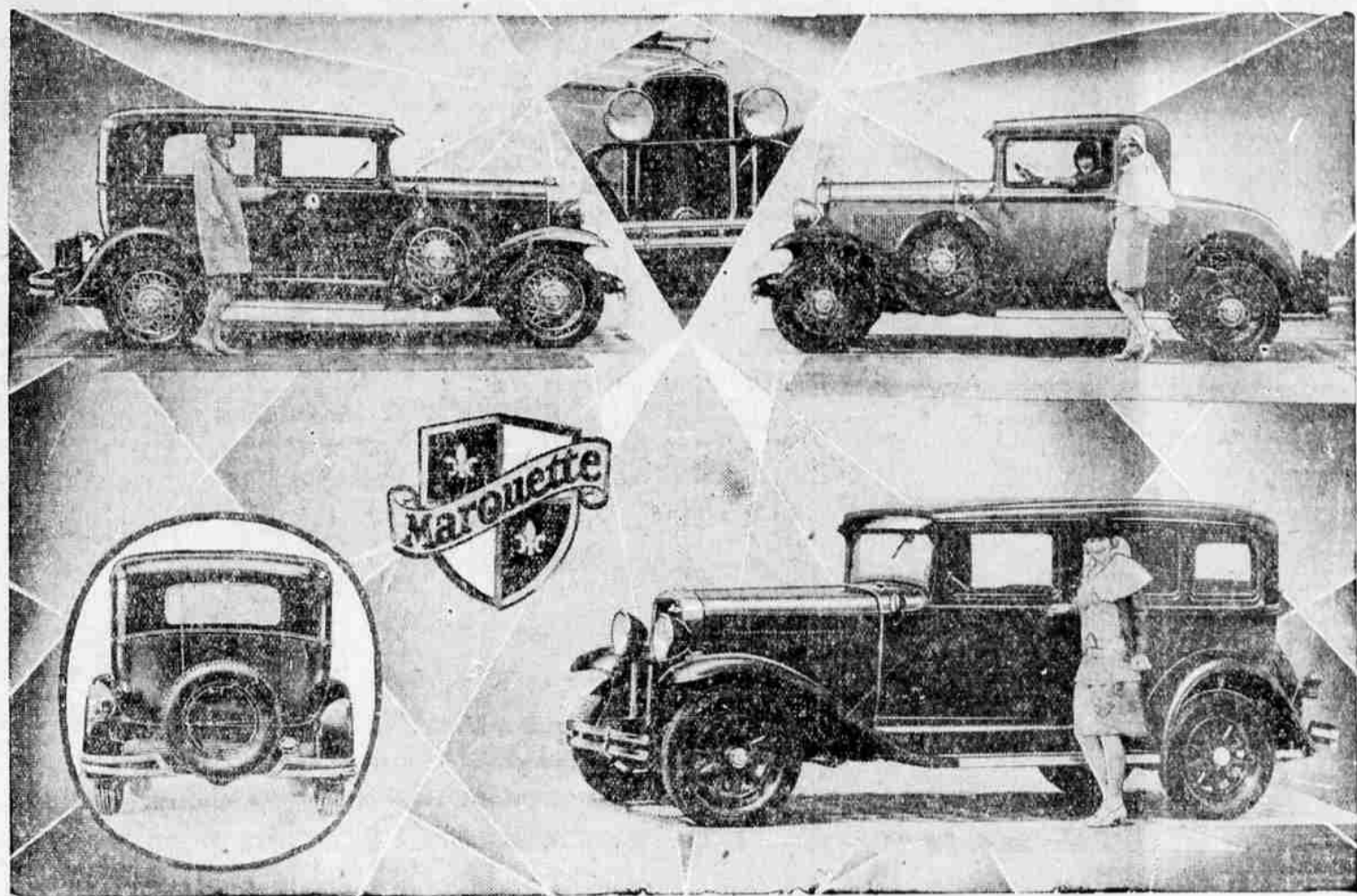


NEW COMPANION TO BUICK ON DISPLAY TODAY
