IRREVERENT WORD ABOUT POPE POOR TASTE, IN ITALY

ROME.—(A) Guarded conversation or song in public places, always desirable in Italy, has become additionally so since the recognition by the government of the Vatican as a sovereign power. Slights upon King Victor Emmanuel and Benito Mussolini have been sternly suppressed ever since the fascists took over control. Now the inhibitions apply equally to the pope and his officials.

No more will gay young Roman bucks be permitted to disguise themselves as cardinals in the carnivals that precede Lent. Visiting and resident Frenchmen must forego warbling some of their country's traditional songs in which friars or monks have the leading roles.

A venerable and notably devout arch prelate, whose sense of right amusement at all things here below has not been destroyed by 26 years' residence in austere Rome, was severely taken to task recently for a casual reference to "the fine Italian hand of the old gentleman on the other bank of the Tiber." He expostulated that he was not referring to the pontiff, but to the latter's more mundane secretary of state, Cardinal Gasparri.

"It is all the same," he was informed by the political personage who overheard him, "since the conclusion of the lateran treaty, something has been changed in the state of affairs in Italy. Even you, monsignor, must observe it."

FRENCH STARS IN YANKEE 'TALKIES' THORN TO PARIS

PARIS.—(A) French film producers who have been busily engaged in trying to force upon American movie concerns the ratio of three American films in France for one French film in America, have suddenly awakened to the fact that if they do not get up and hustle, the lead in supplying talkies to their own country is to be taken away from them by the very American competition which they are fighting.

The language difficulty which has shielded them from the fear of American talkies, will not much longer afford them protection. This was realized when the announcement was made that Maurice Chevalier, "the darling of the boulevard," and the most popular music hall performer in Paris, was now engaged in the making of a talking picture which is to be called "Le Prince Consort."

Then it was further announced that Sacha Guitry and his wife, Yvonne Printemps, two of the foremost French actors in the legitimate drama, had practically accepted terms to appear in a sound film.

The French public is just awakening to the enormous attraction of the "talkies." Although the French spectators did not understand a word of the songs of Al Jolson sung in his "Jazz Singer," the film has been running to packed houses on the boulevards for weeks.

Movie house managers in Paris are all fitting their theaters for sound pictures. At first they were inclined to argue whether the talking film was sound in principle. But realization that whatever it might be in principle it packed their houses, ended that discussion.

SOUTH POLE AREA TOUTED AS PLACE FOR AILING ONES

LONDON.—(A) If Sir Douglas Mawson has his way in the Antarctic, the south pole one day will be a health resort.

Sir Douglas, who was on the scientific staff of the Shackleton expedition in 1907 and led the Australian Antarctic expedition of 1911-14, has left London to make final preparations in Australia for a new exploration of the south-eastern continent which he hopes will prove the practicability of colonizing that ice bound region.

The government has lent him Scott's old ship, the discovery and officially the purpose of the expedition is to continue the charting of the Antarctic coastline and to study the life and habits of the whale.

However, Sir Douglas looks beyond the immediate objective and regards his task as the first step in the development of a new land. He is confident that colonists will follow the explorer (as they did in the development of America), and that in a few years the polar continent will be dotted with fishing and mining settlements.

It may be a far cry from such rude settlements to the sort of thing one expects to see in health resorts, but Sir Douglas sees nothing illogical in the thought of health resorts of the future being built there. The atmosphere of the Pole, he points out, is totally devoid of dust and innocent of any kind of germs (which do much of their traveling on dust particles). The climate, in fact, he asserts, is "the healthiest in the world," and the polar world a region of gorgeous beauty.

Apparently the explorer's enthusiasm for south polar climate and scenery is the contagious sort, for before he left here he received scores of applications for posts with his expedition—several of them from women. His reply to the feminine aspirants was:

"Not this trip. What we need on this expedition is men who have been on similar expeditions before. Captain Davis wants sailors; I want scientific experts."

Capt. J. K. Davis, Sir Douglas' second in command, will remain here with the Discovery until she is ready to sail in August. Sir Douglas will join the ship at Capetown.

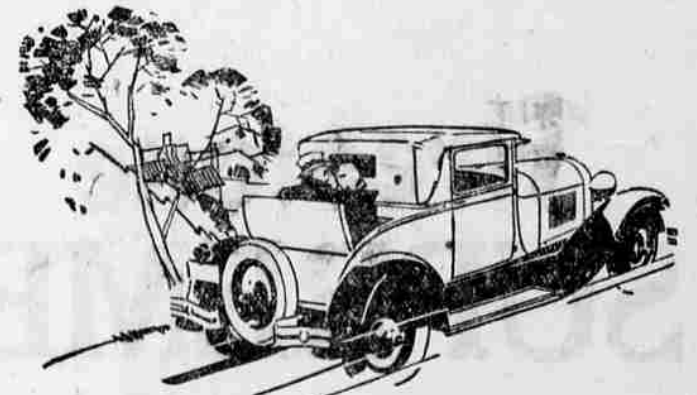
