

FLOWER SHOW IS LARGEST DISPLAY BY GARDEN CLUB

With the beautiful new Kimball jacking house as a setting the Medford Garden club opened the doors to the public at 1 o'clock today on the largest flower show ever staged here. With the formal non-orchestra being performed by Mayor A. W. Hines, the display will continue throughout the afternoon and evening, closing at 9:30 tonight.

The center of the glistering white jacking house was given over to an artistic and profuse arrangement of roses of every known variety and color, ranging from deep velvety reds to pure white.

Special exhibitions were contributed by the Eden Valley nursery, featuring the various types of shrubs and plants, and the Rogue Valley Floral company, specializing in a variety of flowers and floral decorations.

A certain section of the house

was given over to dining room table decorations in flower arrangements. One of particular delicacy was a yellow bowl of fresh flowers, salmon pink rose buds and dainty blue flax. Another was a center piece arrangement combining forget-me-nots, Cochl Bruner roses and pansies.

Then there was the tall flower display placed along the side of the auditorium, and emphasizing the beauty of the rose-colored Oriental poppy and the yellow Day lily.

"The best arrangement of wild flowers" showed many of the favorite Oregon wild flowers in attractive settings. Among these were the Mountain flowers or lady mittens arranged in an Indian basket of brown and gold.

Clever models of landscapes and arbors were included in the children's department of the flower show. Among these was an attractive set made by the beginner's class of the Presbyterian church Sunday school. Another beautiful miniature was entered by little Nancy Day, showing the well-planned landscape garden of her parents in their home in the Tule Lake district. Those who attended the great Baptist state convention in Roseburg May 21st to 24th will never forget the wonder of it. Speakers such as Dr. James West of the First Baptist church of San Francisco held their hearers, eager to catch the vision, spellbound with their God-given messages. Dr. West spoke on "Our God," and those hearing him got a thrill such as the world cannot meet.

In speaking of the greatness and goodness of God, Dr. West said, "You take the best father and the best mother on earth, put them together and give them the divine and infinite, and you have only a faint conception of God's greatness. How can anyone doubt the God who created this whole universe; the mountains, the rivers, the trees and flowers and all the unspeakable riches of this world which is only a small part of the universe?"

Dr. J. W. Bailey of the Theological seminary of Berkeley gave a series of inspiring talks on the life of Paul, one of the outstanding characters of history.

Mr. Boyle of the national Y. M. C. A. also was a speaker. Mr. Boyle is not only a big man in brain power but in stature, so that the ability of a group of men to throw him out on his ear, because of some rather pointed remarks he had wanted to make at some previous gathering of Baptists.

Dr. John Marvin Dean, pastor of the Hinson Memorial church of Portland, gave a stirring address on the "Reason for Our Existence." He said we are here not for fame nor wealth nor power, but for service.

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NATIONAL PUBLICITY FOR ROGUE VALLEY
