

JUNKMEN CARTING OFF LAST OF OLD JACKSONVILLE R. R.

The old trolley cars, passenger coaches and freight cars, which were once proud possessions of the Jacksonville railroad, have all found their way to the junk heap, and for the past several days the iron of which they were largely made, has been dumped unceremoniously into a scolding gondola freight car near the Western Union station. The 200 tons of junk is to be shipped to Portland and loaded as ballast on a steamer bound for Japan, where it will be melted and used again.

Every vestige of the rolling stock of the old road has been taken up for junk, and for several days the old cars were being destroyed by the wood and leaving the most important portion of the cars—the iron—behind. This made up most of the four cars of junk being shipped out, one car coming from the Owen-Oregon mill and another car being picked up in various parts of the valley.

The heavier pieces were being loaded yesterday and today through the use of special equipment, while curious onlookers stood around listening to the heavy clank of old car wheels, springs and air-brake containers as they fell into the gondola, ready to start for Japan.

TALENT GROWERS ESTIMATE CROPS

The Talent district fruit growers held their monthly meeting Friday night at the Talent Irrigation district office. There was an attendance of over 20 of the leading fruit growers in the Talent district. Robert Morris of the Southern Oregon experiment station gave a very interesting and enlightening address on "pest control."

An interesting part of the program was the taking of a poll of the growers present as to the percentage of the crop that they estimated they had at this time. The poll showed that there was 50 per cent of the apple crop; 70 per cent of the Bartlett's, 75 per cent of the Doves, 75 per cent of the Anjou's, 30 per cent of the Comice, 77 per cent of the Winter Nellis, and 55 per cent of the Howells. This made an average of 65 per cent of the apple crop and 50 per cent of the other fruit crops. The fruit growers may be a little pessimistic, but feel that having sprayed every tree, they are pretty good judges as to how much of the fruit there is.

**RECOMMEND MAKING
VALLEY DEER PRESERVE**

It has been suggested by old-time deer hunters in Rogue River valley, who know the habits of deer and the real cause of the scarcity of the deer in mountains of that section, that since the predatory animals have driven the deer from their stronghold in the mountains to the foothills and settlements for protection they be given real protection. It is recommended that these foothills be by law made a preserve for the remnants of former large herds of deer which formerly ranged in isolated reaches of the mountains.

The ranchers along the foothills and close-in streams, especially along Rogue river, say it will be impractical and that the deer, chased by timber wolves, coyotes and panthers will come into the barn yards and other farm enclosures with the domestic stock, seeking the protection of the farm dog.

It is impossible to fence against the deer, which feed on gardens and other crops. Unless the deer are better protected in isolated districts from predatory animals they soon will become extinct.

After the deer once associate with domestic animals they are easy victims of the hunter's gun in the open season and are killed by the poachers the entire year, say old-time sportsmen—Oregonian.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending May 29, according to the state industrial accident commission.

HOPKINS LATERAL USERS WILL SEEK WATER DISTRICT

A petition asking that a water district be formed for the acreage under the Hopkins Lateral ditch, will be filed with the county court tomorrow in the regular meeting, and the petition will come under the provisions of the new law, effective today, providing for the forming of water districts. A considerable sum will thus be saved the water district, in advertising.

It is expected that the election for the forming of the new water district will be called for the first week in July.

A drainage map showing all the acreage involved is now being prepared, and will be filed with the county court. The acreage extends from the northern city limits of Medford to Rogue river.

The new water district will be in a position to take over the management of the ditch from the Mt. Pitt irrigation district by next year, per agreement signed two months ago, with the irrigation company.

There is a maze of detail to be worked out in this step, the work being in charge of a committee composed of P. E. Upton, Victor Bursell, John Garlin, Mike Hanley and Don Clark.
