KUBLI TO INSPECT MINE DEVELOPMENT

K. K. Kubli of Portland, the well known Jackson county native, business man of the state metropolis and prominent member of the state legislature for years from there, arrived here yesterday and this evening or tomorrow will go to his gold mine at the head of Galis creek. After spending a day or so looking after the big development work there being done by two crews of miners, he will return to Portland for a short time and then come back to the mine to spend the summer and fall.

A new lead was recently discovered in this valuable mine, and other striking developments there. Mr. Kubli was informed by letter, are held back only awaiting his arrival.

Hence Mr. Kubli was today anxiously looking forward to his mine visit. Tunneling work is being done under the mountain and he predicts before long that some wonderful news will come out of this mine, which for many years has been a rich producer and which has reopened four years ago and has been developing with modern equipment.

In discussing state affairs and especially the income and other tax reform agitation, Mr. Kubli said today that in his opinion the situation was such that he felt sure that a special session of the legislature would be called within the next two years.

Campers Warned Mountain Streams Not Always Free of Contamination, Boiling of Water Best Safeguard

Though the water may be as clear as crystal and though it may come rippling and gurgling over rocks and sand, seemingly possessed of purity, mountain streams are a possible cause of disease, especially typhoid fever, and the county health unit thru its medical director, Dr. Emily Bolcom, warns local campers planning trips to the hills and mountains to use caution in drinking creek water. Boiling is advised as a complete prevention against the disease.

Because it is a mountain stream is no assurance that it has not been polluted from a source invisible to the users, as there may be other campers farther up the stream and still farther up there may be natural causes of pollution.

The symptoms, characterizing the onset of typhoid fever, are less marked than those of other fevers. The most marked of the early symptoms are headache, lassitude and discomfort, together with sleeplessness and feverishness, particularly at night, the last being the symptom by which the disease is most readily detected. It is no unusual thing to register fever of 104 and 105 degrees in the evening and from 102 to 104 in the morning. The fever gradually dies down in the general run of cases from the 21st to 28th days.

Although the patient may, during the early days of the fever, be able to move about, he feels

languid and uneasy and usually before the end of the first week he has to take to bed. He is restless, hot and uncomfortable and his cheeks show a red flush, especially after taking food. The disease is caused by bacillus typhosus, discovered by Eberth in 1880, multiplying rapidly in the body of the person suffering from the disease. It enters the body by being swallowed and is conveyed to the intestine, where it sets up its characteristic inflammation, according to a description of the disease, and often results fatally.

The bacillus is said to live a month in sterilized water and in ordinary water, containing other organisms, it dies in a fortnight. In ordinary soil moistened by rain it has lived for 67 days, in dust for 25 days and in sterilized soil for over 400 days. When exposed to sunlight it dies in four to eight hours and is killed by a temperature of 58 degrees, centigrade.

The susceptibility is said to vary greatly and some persons are, perhaps, immune to the disease, with the most susceptible age ranging between 15 and 25 years. The aged rarely contract it and men are said to suffer more than women.

In view of the seriousness of the disease, campers are urged to be sure of their water supply before they drink from mountain streams and springs without first boiling the water.

LOCAL MEN LUCKY IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Virgil (Dutch) Coggin and Guy Kelly, local young men, narrowly averted death and serious injuries early this morning when a 1927 Buick roadster in which they were riding from Klamath Falls to Medford skidded, overturned and caught fire on the Pacific highway a short distance south of Ashland.

Both occupants were rendered unconscious. Kelly was thrown clear of the car, while Coggin remained in the machine, not regaining his senses till the auto was ablaze. Kelly emerged, unscratched, but the latter sustained a number of painful bruises. The car, a total loss, was partially covered by insurance.

Issue Dividend
GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—The Robert E. Gold Mining company of this city has issued its first dividend. The amount is two per cent for the June declaration. The company announced that funds are on hand for dividends of like amounts in July and August. The mine is located in the headwaters of the Clatsop river and has been in operation for eight years.

THUNDER SHOWER BLOWS FUSES ON SUBURBAN LINES

The two separate thunder storms, the first at 3:55 o'clock yesterday afternoon and the other at 7:25 o'clock last evening, during which there was a deluge of rain, and accompanied by some wind and sharp lightning, did no damage beyond blowing the fuses on 10 distributing transformers of the California Oregon power company in the city and suburbs, which left various neighborhoods without lights and power until the company crews could make repairs, and the rain drenching much hay down throughout the valley.

During the night there were several more copious showers and in all during the 24 hours ending at 9 a. m. today the rainfall amounted to .46 of an inch, making the total rainfall since September 1, last, 11.56 inches. Today was cloudy and threatening, and showers are forecast for tonight and Wednesday.

Relative to the lightning damage of yesterday, a section of the power company's line on the Old Stage road or Millionaire road was burned down and fuses on distributing transformers were blown, in addition to fuses fading into dwellings. Due to safeguards installed by the power company, the service was not cut off for commission for any length of time. However, special crews were engaged in repairing the trouble until midnight.

The rain that fell over the valley late yesterday and during last night dampened thousands of tons of the first cutting of hay without any appreciable damage, and was beyond value to the second hay crop, the corn, the orchards and the gardens.

When the black clouds gathered in the west there was great scurrying in the fields to get the hay into barns and sheds. County Judge Sparrow had nine men mowing outcrops yesterday, and last night the rain started to fall the "pick-up" load of two fields was en route to the barn. The thunder and lightning frightened a young mare, and it was necessary to run the hay wagon in a circle to avert a runaway.

Judge Sparrow said that as a result of the warm showers, "You can see the corn walking toward heaven."

Practically every farmer in the valley had his down when the storm came. They are now applying the pioneer philosophy of the Rogue valley farmers: "We can afford to lose half the first crop by rain for the good it does the second crop."
