

GUN CLUB WILL SPONSOR STATE SHOOT IN FALL

Rapid Progress in Organizing Sportsmen's Body Reported—Club House Will Be Built—Membership Drive Under Way.

Progress of the organization of a Rogue River valley gun club has been so satisfactory since it was first announced several weeks ago that the establishment of the club is now assured, according to S. G. Mendenhall, temporary secretary and treasurer, who said last evening over 5000 in memberships and donations had been received. With the major portion of the membership campaign yet to take place, so certain is the establishment of the club, giving Medford one of the best gun and trap shooting organizations in the state, that plans are being made for a two-day state-wide shoot here next August. Over 30 trap shooters from California have announced their intention of being present. In addition to delegations from all parts of the state, including a large one from the Coast Bay district.

The meet will be held on the club's new grounds, yet to be located and prepared for use. With the response from local and southern Oregon sportsmen so good, plans for the new organization have a suggestion of the elaborate in that a comfortable club house, including a lounge room, business office, store room and other rooms, will be constructed on the club grounds nearest the entrance.

There will be two traps, and plans include landscaping and the planting of blue grass to enhance the attractiveness of the spaces between the trap shooting walks used in handicap shooting. A neat arrangement of settees for spectators will be arranged at a safe distance from the line of fire. Present plans call for one of the most complete trap shooting grounds in the state, and promise one of the best assets in the community for sportsmen, especially tourists who are expected to take advantage of the grounds, many of whom are trap shooters.

ATHLETICS TAKE YANK PLACE AS RUNAWAY TEAM

McGillicuddy's Men Leading Second Place Browns Over Five Games—Geo. Uhle's Winning Streak Broken at 9 By Athletics.

While five clubs snipe away at the National League lead, Cornelius McGillicuddy's Philadelphia Athletics have taken over the duty usually reserved for the Yankees of making a runaway out of the American league race.

Only five games separate the first five clubs in the National league, while the Athletics have a greater lead than that over the St. Louis Browns, who hold doggedly on to second place, much to the disgust of certain American league experts.

The A's had to travel 32 innings to down Detroit, and hung up their sixth straight win and sixteenth in their last 18 games yesterday, and they shattered George Uhle's nine-game winning streak while they were about it.

The Browns kept step with a 6 to 4 triumph at Washington's expense, getting to Garland Braxton for four runs in the first inning. Sammy Gray kept the Senators' ten hits well scattered.

The "Ruth-less" New York Yankees made it three in a row over the Chicago White Sox, winning 1-0 behind Ed Wells' two-hit pitching. The Yankees scored their single tally in the first inning on Combs' single and the first of three doubles by Gene Robertson.

The dings-dong fight continued in the National league with the St. Louis Cardinals maintaining their game and a half lead over the Pirates.

The Cardinals tossed out Brooklyn, 9 to 8, in a heavy hitting fray in which there was little to choose between either club. Johnny Frederick hit a home run, double and single, but even that couldn't aid the Robins to victory.

SATURDAY LAST DAY OF DANCING AFTERMIDNIGHT

Darken Dance Halls of County at Zero Hour Or Lose Bond, Says Sheriff—Licenses Required for All Country Halls.

One more big night and then forever after, or as long as the bill as passed by the last state legislature remains in effect, the dance halls in Jackson county will be dark after midnight. Next Saturday night will be the last time in this county that dance pavilions will be open in the morning hours, and preparations are being made by the various halls to stage exceptionally interesting programs.

In view of the programs leniency will be allowed one more night, although the bill was officially in effect early this week. The new dance law will be rigidly enforced and midnight means midnight, said Sheriff Ralph Jennings today. There will be no exceptions to the rule, he declared.

The all-night dances, up until the passage of the bill, were looked upon with disfavor because of alleged intoxication, which was said to have been present at a number of halls. However, at other pavilions intoxicating liquor was rarely ever seen and these pavilions did not present such serious problems. However, they are placed in the same category and must close on time. As a rule the dances had been operated up until 2 and 3 o'clock in the morning, causing officers more work in patrolling highways and doing special duty about the dance halls. On one occasion several months ago a dance hall was closed because of too much boisterousness and alleged intoxication.

While there is little probability it will ever take place, a portion of the dancers are wondering if special dispensation may sometime be

made to have late dances. At the least, in view of the new closing hour, private dancing parties are apt to become popular and those who persist in all night celebrating will have their celebrations just the same, but not in public.

Law Quoted

The dance hall law is as follows: "Sec. 3682. A public dance hall is hereby defined for the purpose of this act to be any building, room, hall, pavilion, tent or other place within the state of Oregon and outside of the corporate limits and boundaries of any incorporated town or city having a population of 500 people or more kept and maintained or used for public dancing, and or in which for compensation paid directly or indirectly to the owner, proprietor, manager, lessee or operator thereof, men and women are permitted to engage in dancing or where any class is given instruction in dancing for hire, or in which a social club, whether incorporated or not, is operated for profit by the owner, proprietor, lessee or manager thereof.

"Sec. 3683. No dance hall as defined by this act shall be used for dancing purposes until license therefor has been obtained. Application for such license shall be made in writing to the county clerk of the county within which such hall shall be located at 10 days before any dance is to be held in such hall, which application shall be signed by the applicant and by at least 12 freeholders residing in the school district in which such dance hall is located, which freeholders shall certify that applicant is of good moral character and requesting that license shall issue.

"If the county clerk is satisfied such applicant will run an orderly house, he shall make an order what license issue to such applicant upon his filing with the clerk of the court a bond approved by the court in a sum not less than \$500, conditioned that applicant will keep at all times an orderly house; that he will permit no dancing in said building between midnight and 6 o'clock in the morning; that he will not offer or permit or allow any intoxicating liquor in or about said building, and that in case any of said conditions be violated he will pay to the state of Oregon the amount of said bond.

marketed in four large centers—
2. Increased production—A great increase in production here and in other sections is going to make it necessary in the very near future to stimulate consumption at points where the Bosc pear is not well known. This should be done now and not wait until the increase in production has reached a point where the present markets will not absorb the total output.
3. First in new fields—Medford should be first in the new mar-

kets, as there is always a decided advantage in getting your wares before the public ahead of your competitor.

The Bosc committee will now be known as the winter pear committee, as in addition to opening up new markets for the Bosc variety it is their purpose to try and remedy the fact that a certain percentage of all of the late varieties are being offered to the public in unsatisfactory condition. The committee believes that the demand for winter pears can be greatly stimulated and the general price level raised, provided the fruit can be packed so that it will come out of storage in good condition, of high quality, and free from cuts and bruises.

It is the purpose of the committee to investigate storage conditions in the large eastern centers, to secure better methods of ripening the fruit; to collect data at the proper time for the sale of the different varieties, in order that our late pears may reach the ultimate consumer in the best of condition.

All of the largest distributors in New York City have urged the local committee to get busy this year and put over a selling campaign in one or more cities. They have over and over again made the statement that they are willing to co-operate with the growers in any plan that promises better distribution of the Bosc variety. Also they have signified their desire to help the winter pear committee collect all possible data on the condition and quality of fruit offered for consumption.

Carl W. Kimball, Kenneth H. Day, Wayne M. French, Alfred Welner, C. E. Thurston, J. S. Crutchfield, John S. Deegan and E. W. J. Henry represent some of the better known firms and are in accord with the committee. These distributors have been in business for many years. They have been quite frank in their statements regarding the possibility of lower prices for all varieties of pears unless we open up new markets. The present plan of the local committee is thoroughly acceptable to all of our eastern distributors, and the local committee is now greatly encouraged by the attitude of the growers at the meeting of last Saturday.

A meeting of the Fruit Growers' league will be called as soon as the selecting committee has canvassed all of the Bosc growers, and every fruit grower in the district should attend this meeting, the date of which will be announced shortly in all local papers.
