

ORDINANCE REGULATES MILK SALE

Inspector to Be Employed—State Dairy Law Followed—Dealers Must Pay License of \$12 Per Year and Percentage On Sales—Dairies Said to Favor New Ordinance.

An ordinance providing for a pure milk supply, clean dairies, the inspection of all dairy cows and dairies, and the employment of an inspector was passed by the city council last night, to go into effect in ten days.

This inspector will be appointed by Mayor Pipes of Medford, but if the two cities combine, by the mayors of each.

The ordinance does not require pasteurization, leaving that matter optional with the producers of milk sold at retail.

To pay for the dairy inspection, etc., each dairy or person who sells milk at retail will be charged a flat license of \$12 a year, or \$1 a month, no matter how many dairy cows possessed, and in addition a percentage on the quantity of milk sold.

De L. D. Inskeep, city health officer, who has been the leading factor in having this ordinance passed by the city council, in speaking in behalf of it before the council last night, said that the dairies favored the measure, meaning, of course, the larger ones.

Adulterated milk shall be understood to mean any milk to which has been added any substance other than milk or cream, or any milk from which any constituent has been taken except for the purpose of standardization; milk from diseased cows or milk containing an excessive number of bacteria as defined in this ordinance.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, dispose of, or to offer to keep for sale as human food, any milk or milk products within the city of Medford, Oregon, without first obtaining a license therefor from the city recorder.

Application for License. Any person desiring a milk license shall make application to the city recorder, stating the following facts:

- (a) Name and place of residence of the applicant.
(b) Whether the said applicant is a producer of milk.
(c) The exact location of dairy and land producing the milk.
(d) The number of cows in each dairy herd.
(e) If the applicant is not a producer of milk, the name of each person from whom he obtains or is about to obtain his milk; the location and address of each dairy; and the number of cows in each herd from which the milk is obtained.

All utensils used in the handling of milk must be of such material and so constructed as to be easily cleaned and shall be kept in good repair. They shall be free from rancid or other substances and shall be used for no other purpose than the handling of milk.

Health and Care of Cows. All cows producing milk for sale shall be properly stabled, fed and cared for and shall be free from tuberculosis or other contagious or infectious diseases.

(tuberculin test shall be made of the entire herd at least once a year and all reacting animals removed and no outside animals shall be introduced into the herd until satisfactory evidence is given showing them free from the disease.)

Where any reacting animals are found in a herd they shall be immediately removed and isolated and the entire herd shall be retested within six months.

The flanks, udders and teats of all milking cows shall be thoroughly cleaned before each milking.

Before any person shall engage in the production, handling, storing or transportation of raw milk or milk products for sale within the city, he shall be required to hold a certificate from the health officer certifying to the fact that within 12 months an examination has been made showing the holder thereof free from any contagious, infectious or communicable disease or any disease capable of being spread by milk.

It shall be the duty of any distributor of milk or milk products to report to the health officer, within 24 hours, any case of sickness or any infectious, contagious or communicable disease which shall occur upon his premises or among his employees.

This inspector will be appointed by Mayor Pipes of Medford, but if the two cities combine, by the mayors of each. The proposed salary will be \$150 a month, and also expenses for the maintenance of the inspector's auto.

TATTOO OUTFIT IS AVAILABLE OFFICE OF COUNTY AGENT

The county agent's office has a tattoo outfit for use in branding all types of poultry so that brands can be registered with the state veterinarian, who has charge of all brand registration.

It will be necessary to go to the city systematically. The county agent, R. C. Fowler, will assign the different brands as the calls come for them.

CELEBRATION FOR SIXTH ST. LIGHTS SATURDAY NIGHT

SEEK ECONOMY AS PORT FUND DWINDLE FAST

Council Paring Estimate to Cover Necessities—Margin of \$2000 in Sight Now—Cannot Touch Regular Funds of City.

The city council, with the amount of money already spent in grading and leveling the airfield, etc., and with the coming big estimated expenses of draining the field, building the first runway, hangar with lean-to's or a separate administration building, which are absolute necessities, is strictly up against it financially.

This would leave only \$2000 for extra necessities that always hot in any new building venture, which is far from being a sufficient leeway, the city administration feels.

Finally the discussion wound up with the agreement that Mr. Clark would go over with various contractors, the estimated expenditures, to learn the amounts of the probable bids they would make, and report back to the council.
