

# CRESCENT PLANS BIG CELEBRATION ON JULY 3 AND 4

One of the most extensive Independence Day celebrations ever planned in this section of the country will be staged July 3 and 4 at Crescent City by the Del Norte American Legion Post No. 175. Legionnaires and auxiliary members from Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and surrounding cities are now formulating plans to attend the entertainment features in the southern city.

Drum corps contests, large open air band concerts and sports, including baseball and foot races, are among the many attractions planned. Three U. S. first line warship defense units will welcome visitors during both days of the celebration. There will be a military parade featuring sailors from warships as well as visiting drum and bugle corps from neighboring towns.

Following the dedication of the Veterans' Memorial hall, built by citizens of Del Norte county at a cost of \$69,000, there will be a large dedication ball the night of July 3. In the afternoon there will be street dancing.

Inspired by the fact that the best clam tides of the year will be on at the dates of the celebration, the American Legion has also planned a clam digging contest. For the children there will be a unique treasure hunt on the program, as well as a generous supply of fireworks on the beach, augmented by searchlights and anti-aircraft guns from the visiting U. S. fleet.

# EASTBOUND FRUIT SHIPMENTS WILL MAKE FAST TIME

To equalize railroad schedules on shipments of California perishable products to Atlantic seaboard points via St. Louis and Chicago, the Santa Fe, Western Pacific, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific Wednesday announced a schedule of 146 hours from California concentration points to Chicago.

The new schedule is based on 2 a. m. departure from Roseville, Sacramento, Bakersfield, San Bernardino and Colton, which will provide seventh day connections at Chicago and St. Louis with Pennsylvania and Erie trains effecting 10th morning delivery in New York. Territory within 16 hours of Sacramento, Bakersfield and Roseville and within seven hours of Colton and San Bernardino will operate on this schedule.

Effective June 10 the Pennsylvania and Erie railroads will establish afternoon trains from Chicago and morning trains from St. Louis to effect third morning delivery on the Atlantic seaboard.

# AMERICAN MISSIONARY ELUDES CHINESE REDS

PERKIN, China, June 6.—(AP)—Official foreign sources today said that Dr. C. H. Holliman, American missionary who was captured and held for ransom by communists at Lungyenchow, southern Fukien, May 23, had escaped.

A letter received at Amoy from Lungyenchow said the missionary after four days had eluded 3000 brigands and started about toward Tapu, Kwangtung, apparently hoping to reach Swatow.

Holliman's wife and children escaped originally and made their way to Amoy.

EAST BRAINTREE, Mass., June 6.—(AP)—Two men were missing, at least three were injured, and property damage estimated as high as \$500,000, was caused by an explosion and fire which early today swept a portion of the Ford river plant of the Cities Service Refining company. The exploding were Gordon C. Chase, night superintendent of the plant, and Henry Minor, a workman. The blast rocked the surrounding territory for miles.

# MAIL ORDER BRIDE MUST SPEND LIFE IN PENITENTIARY

SONORA, Cal., June 6.—(AP)—Mrs. Eva Rabben, matrimonial agency bride from Texas, was sentenced to life imprisonment yesterday after she told superior court how she passed a cup of poison-laden coffee to her dead husband, Carroll Rabben, as part of a suicide pact, but she left the death-dealing cup pass her lips and then watched her husband die in agony.

Mrs. Rabben's change of front and plea of guilty surprised Superior Judge B. T. Warne. As he pressed the question to her as to the sincerity of her plea, he intimated that such a plea might call for hanging. But after listening to her story on the stand the court decided on a life sentence with the provision that she never be paroled.

The paradoxical story told by Mrs. Rabben on the stand yesterday gave the court a new aspect. The widow said that her husband tried to take his life on many occasions, but that she had prevented him.
