EXPERTS RATIFY REPARATION PLAN

DOCUMENT DICTATES PAYMENT

Next Step Up to Governments Involved—Signing of Report Settles Problem of Ten Years' Standing—Annuities Plan of Owen D. Young Given Approval by Germans.

PARIS, June 7.—(AP)—The experts' report, liquidating the long controversial reparations problem that has troubled the peace of Europe for the past 10 years, was signed at the Hotel George V. today.

The signatures to the historic document which fixes the payments that Germany must make to the allied creditors for the next 59 years were affixed at 5:50 p. m. (11:50 a. m. eastern standard time).

It had been planned to sign the report at 5 p. m. Paris time (11 a. m. eastern standard time) but as it was almost that hour when the last minute polishing had been completed the signing did not take place until 5:50 p. m.

By the settlement, the German experts gave their approval to the annuities suggested by Owen D. Young, American financial expert, whose unceasing labors to find some sort of an agreement, at length had been crowned with success.

With the long four months negotiations, that at times threatened to break down, now definitely settled, the next step was up to the governments involved, ratification of the experts' recommendations being necessary as well as complete plans for working out the details.

NAVAL OFFICER CREDITED WITH NEW SKY MARK

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—Establishment of a new world's seaplane altitude record by Lieutenant Apollo Soucek of the navy in his attempt Tuesday was announced today by the National Aeronautic association after a check of his barograph by the bureau of standards.

Soucek exceeded by 500 feet the record of 37,995 made by Lieutenant C. C. Chamption of the navy in the same Wright Apache plane two years ago.

Soucek recently set a new altitude record for land planes, attaining a height of 39,144 feet, but the honor was short lived as a few days later a German flyer, Willy Neunhofer, pushed his plane upward to a new world record of 42,123 feet.

The naval flyer set the new record for seaplanes on June 4, taking off at the naval air station here.

SHRINERS OPEN ANNUAL CONCLAVE WITH PRAYER

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 7.—(AP)—Fairyland was re-created to the echoing cheers of 80,000 persons in Los Angeles' huge Coliseum last night as the city bid farewell to the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. The 55th annual conclave came to an end under a many-hued blaze of lights as the million dollar electrical pagoda wended its spectacular way around the great bowl.

Following the flickering rainbow fingers of a man-made aurora borealis, new worlds whirled through space, yawning caverns belched rosy fire, desert caravans were etched in silver and bronze, and gardens of fragile flowers shed incandescent gleams. The spectacle sent starting Shriners to their waiting trains in a bewildered shower of electric magic. Early today the massed special trains began moving out of the city's railway stations. The exodus was to continue with little reduction in volume until tomorrow.

As the Shriners departed, selection of the 1930 convention city had not been made. New Orleans, Atlantic City and Toronto, Canada, were the chief bidders at yesterday's imperial council session. Decision was deferred pending a survey of hotel facilities and other requirements. No applications for new temples were presented during the conclave.

DIPLOMAS AWARDED GRADUATES

Largest Class in Colorful Commencement — Address By Dean Dubach Praised — Salutary and Valedictory Notable Outlines — Present Scholarship Awards.

"The members of this class represent the finished product of the foremost enterprise of the school, said the valedictorian of the 56th annual commencement of the high school at Hunt's Craterian theatre last night, in speaking of the largest class ever graduated from the local high school, 102 members.

"Just as the Rogue River valley is judged by the quality of its products sold in the markets of the nation, so the quality of the education afforded this community will be judged by the achievements of the members of this and other classes," said the speaker.

The commencement, the usual colorful affair of beauty, educational oratory and music, with the big theatre crowded to capacity, drew the comment from many after it was over that it was the greatest commencement in Medford's history. "Where one will eventually be depends on the direction he goes. Whether or not one knows how to spend a dollar wisely if he had one, will have much to do with his ultimate finish.

"Whether or not one has a decent respect for his body is important. I stress the fact that one cannot get spare parts for the human body. BERRY CROP OF STATE SUFFERS IN HEAVY RAIN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Unless the moisture is soon replaced by warm sunshine, Oregon's strawberry crop, which was heralded as one of the finest on record, will rot on the vines, and strawberry jam and jelly will become rarities instead of common household delicacies.

This was the report made today by one buyer for a large produce house after a survey of the market situation.

SALEM, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—A dispatch from Portland quoting a large produce buyer as saying that unless the moisture is replaced by warm sunshine Oregon's strawberry crop will rot on the vines, is discounted by canners and buyers here, center of the northwest's largest strawberry production.

Assertions were made by both canners and buyers here today that ton for ton the strawberry crop will be considerably in excess of last year, and predictions were confidently made of one of the largest strawberry picks in history, with superlative quality berries.

"Prospects are far better now for a big strawberry crop than they were at the same stage last year," said the largest strawberry buyer of this district today.

END STRIFE OF CHURCH AND STATE

Lateran Treaty Signed By Pope Pius and King Victor—Momentous Incident Without Fanfare—Vatican Receives Huge Sum Placed on Account in Bank of Italy.

VATICAN CITY, June 7.—(AP)—The 60-year-old strife between the Roman Catholic church and the Italian government was solemnly ended this forenoon with exchange of ratifications of the Lateran treaty of February 11 by Premier Mussolini and Cardinal Gasparri, papal undersecretary of state.

The copy of the treaty handed by Il Duce to the papal secretary of state, bore the signature and seal of Victor Emmanuel, Italy's king, while that handed Signor Mussolini was signed and sealed similarly by Pope Pius XI.

The ceremony was simple and brief. There were no speeches, and it was terminated with a simple completion process in which it was attested the exchange had been made.

The formally momentous for the Roman Catholic world and the Italian state, occurred in the Hall of Congregations in Cardinal Gasparri's private apartment in the Vatican.

From the moment of the exchange the Lateran treaties entered into full vigor and effect. The new governor of Vatican City, Comendatore Camillo Serafini, entered officially upon his duties and the Swiss Guard took up posts at the new entrances to the Vatican territory.

The great bronze doors opening out upon the colonnade of St. Peter's square which remained half shut for 59 years were opened wide as a significant symbol of the new state of things.

Observance Romans this afternoon published the full text of the Lateran records, the documents relative to ratification and the new law of the papal state, which was prepared by the lawyer, Francesco Pacelli, intermediary for the pope and Mussolini during the two years of negotiations.

The exchange also made effective the financial provisions of the Lateran treaties by which the Vatican can receive bonds for 1,000,000,000 lire (about \$52,000,000) 750,000,000 lire cash, (about \$25,000,000) this latter was given the Holy See in the form of a letter of credit on the Bank of Italy. The Vatican will open a running account with that institution.
