LIDDING MACHINES BEING INSTALLED

The C. & E. company, which recently completed a large addition to its packing plant on South Fir

street, has started the installation of new mechanical equipment, including box lidding and box making machines.

A number of box lidding machines arrived yesterday and are being distributed today to fruit houses. Box making machines will also be installed in most of the packing plants.

These machines cost from \$2500 to \$3500, drive eight rolls at a time, and save time and labor in the lidding of the fruit. They are almost as delicate in their mechanism as a typewriter.

A carload of rolls for local distributors arrived yesterday.
