

TEMPERANCE GAIN IN MEXICO; HOLDS PUBLIC ATTENTION

By John Lloyd. (Associated Press Staff Writer). MEXICO CITY (AP)—President Portes Gil's campaign to rid Mexico of the drink evil has gained such momentum that it has become one of the chief topics of discussion throughout the country and one of the principal subjects of legislation.

The President's appeal to state governments to second his endeavors has met with ready response in the form of orders restricting the drinking of alcoholic liquors, as well as regulating the number of saloons.

Governor Raymond Enriquez of Chiapas has instructed the state treasurer to establish so heavy a tax on intoxicating drinks that their manufacture will be unprofitable. This measure, in addition to discouraging manufacture of liquor, is calculated to oblige the saloons to charge prices beyond the reach of the average man.

Governor Enriquez also has ordered that the saloons be forced to pay increased taxes, hoping through this means to cause many of them to close.

Furthermore, he has prohibited the sale of intoxicants on ranches and farms, many of which employ hundreds of peons.

Similar although less stringent measures have been adopted in other states, and the War Department has prohibited sale of liquor to soldiers. Soldiers who overcome this obstacle and become intoxicated will be subjected to severe punishment.

The government of Mexico City has placed a ban on sale of liquor in dance halls and has notified cabaret proprietors that they will no longer be allowed to employ waitresses. The city fathers hold that these girls become alcohol addicts.

Anti-alcohol leagues have been formed throughout Mexico among mothers, teachers, school children and workers, and lectures on the evils of the drink habit are being given in theaters, the schools, union headquarters and other public assembly places.

FASCISM ORDERS STRAW HATS FOR ITALIAN STUDENTS

ROME (AP)—Straw hats will be practically obligatory this summer, by the terms of a circular issued by Deputy Turati, secretary of the Fascist party, who has been designated by Mussolini as chief of the Fascist university groups.

The headpieces will be decorated with wide ribbons of the color of the wearer's "faculty," or department—law, letters, medicine, engineering and the like. In addition there will be a smaller band of the colors of the particular university—Rome, Naples, Padua or Bologna. Once the scheme is worked out it will permit of close identification of each student.

Desire to boost the Italian straw hat industry is frankly avowed to be behind the plan. Until a couple of years ago, the bare-headed fad was prevalent among Italian youth, and many claimed that the hardening of their scalps to the rays of the summer sun was healthful.

This assertion, however, provoked indignant outbursts from the makers of hats, who constitute an important branch of Italian industry, and whose products are famous all over Europe.

"The sailor straw," says Secretary Turati, "besides being an economical sort of headgear, gives the university student an air of juvenile elegance. Varsity men will thus be able to make their contribution to the prosperity of the nation."

CANADIAN LIQUOR TUG CAUGHT AT CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 7.—(AP)—The tug Neptune, with a cargo which coast guardsmen said was Canadian liquor and ale valued at \$35,000, was captured near the Cleveland harbor early today in the biggest haul there in eight years, according to Captain John Daly, who made the seizure.

A man who gave his name as George White, Leamington, Ontario, was found aboard.

STAMBOUL, Turkey (AP)—The super-moderns of the newly modernized Turkey have opened a campaign against the Stamboul municipal theater's recent addition to its repertory of the plays of William Shakespeare. They contend that the presentation of such out-of-fashion stuff gives the impression that Turkey is not keeping up with the times.

Moreover, even though the plays are, of course, translated into Turkish, it is argued that the language of the bard of Avon is so out of style as to be incomprehensible.

The outbreak of the moderns gave rise to a singular Shakespearean controversy in the Stamboul press. It wound up with a long and solemn proclamation signed by many Turkish writers and artists and published in a pro-Shakespeare newspaper attesting to the worth of the maligned dramatist and to enlightened Turkey's ability to understand him.

Meanwhile the municipal theater continues to present "Hamlet," "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and "As You Like It" along with its repertory of Turkish and highly modern Parisian plays, the latter being the Stamboul public's favorites.

The Turkish theater's interpretation of Shakespeare is interesting. Striking touches include a yellow wig for Hamlet (to show that he is a Dane) and the treatment by Polonius, the King and others, of Hamlet's love for Ophelia as a huge joke.

HIGHEST WELSH PEAK IN DISPUTE: WHO OWNS IT?

CARNARVON, Wales (AP)—No body knows who owns the highest mountain in Wales. Until recently, too, few cared, for the summit of Mount Snowdon was covered with dilapidated buildings quite out of harmony with a spot important enough to be pointed out to sight-seers.
