

REPORT FOR YEAR OF HEALTH WORK IN COUNTY FIELD

The Jackson County Health Association carried on a successful year's program last year, according to its recent annual report prepared by Miss Mildred Carlton, president. A big program is also scheduled for the ensuing year.

A portion of the annual report is as follows: 1. Child Welfare Clinic—There are five monthly held in Ashland, Medford, Mill District, Medford, Central Point and Butte Falls. In the Mill District and Central Point this coming summer there will be especially equipped health centers.

2. Health Education—(a) High schools in Junior and Senior High Schools of Ashland and Medford given over a period of two weeks by Dr. Estella Ford Warner of Marlow City Child Health Demonstration who was loaned to us.

(b) Health talks for high school boys of Ashland, Central Point, Medford and Phoenix by Dr. Edward Russell, from the same demonstration.

(c) Miss Jona Besley of the State Tuberculosis Association spent three weeks in Health Education working with our city and county nurses throughout the county.

(d) Health Honor Roll in 1928 3774 children were given free physical examinations by the physicians and county health officer of Jackson County.

On May Day 1400 marched in a parade, physically and mentally fit. This year all schools were given the opportunity of having Honor Roll boys and girls. This year the Jackson County Fair Board is offering prizes to the Blue Ribbon Children in connection with the Health Honor Roll and the awards will be given on Children's Day during Fair Week.

(e) There was also a Health Institute for all teachers in the county to discuss and explain the Health Honor Roll.

3. Tuberculosis—Our budget allows us \$500 from the Seal Sale receipts to be used for supplying milk, clothing for hospital patients and other necessities for these unfortunate people.

4. Financial—We work on a budget which each year is submitted to the State Tuberculosis Association for approval. Our Christmas Seal Sale in 1928 was \$4872.48. The Membership Drive in 1928 was \$366.99 or 732 members. The Membership Drive in 1929 was \$811.90 or 956 members; and \$398.50 in special donations.

5. Supplies—The communities made 5 layettes, 14 sweaters, 12 O. B. parkies, 12 kimono for clinic, 3 pajamas for tuberculosis cases, 6 towels for use in dental clinic, 2 dentist gowns.

6. Dental Clinic—Last year we started a dental clinic for children who otherwise would have no care. This is not wholly charity as the family pays what they can up to fifty cents. This year we are able to add another afternoon and Dr. Mulholland is being assisted by Dr. Paslow. At these clinics as at all clinics throughout the county, a member of the local health committee assists.

Our aims and hopes for the future are: 1. Instruction in hygiene supplementing services of physicians to help decrease mortality of mothers and infants.

2. Nursing service for mothers at time of confinement.

3. Bed-side care.

4. More members for the Health Association. Our present aim should be 10% of the total population or 2800.

5. Seal Sale increase should be 10% a year.

This is your Association and only through your interest and co-operation can we do the work which is before us.

A pamphlet entitled "Shippers Committee of the Good Railway Service Association" has been received in this city. It sets forth arguments opposing the Klamath Falls and Keddick projects of the Great Northern and Western Pacific railroads.

The chief argument advanced is that the construction of the new line would increase the freight rates over the western states.

It is also contended in the pamphlet that the Klamath-Keddick project in no wise effects the building of transportation lines to other sections.

AMATEUR SINGERS OF VALLEY ENTER AUDITION CONTEST

Young amateur singers of Medford, Ashland and River Valley sections of the Rogue River Valley will be given the opportunity of taking part in the local preliminary of the Atwater Kent national radio audition, at St. Mark's Guild Hall, next Friday, June 14, beginning at eight o'clock.

The contest is open to the public, and the young boys and girls singers will be called by number, rather than by name, to sing their selections on the program.

With the national awards ranging from \$5,000 and the two years' free tuition in a leading eastern conservatory, to \$500 and one year free tuition, as the fifth prize, together with a list of other preliminary awards along the way, it is well worth the time and effort of ambitious young singers and vocal students to enter the contest.

A group of capable judges selected from different sections of the valley will decide the two winners (a boy and a girl) scheduled for the state final scheduled some time in July. The judges will sit with their backs to the stage upon which the singers are to appear, so as to remove any possible chance for bias as to personal appearance or physique of the contestants.

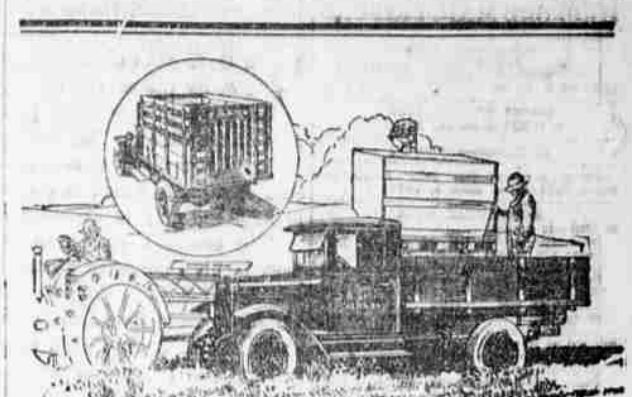

The following list is suggested for supplies and equipment: Extra box, camp shoes and socks, 15 flashlight, canteen, neckerchief, tin or aluminum plate, cup, bowl, or pan about five inches in diameter, kettle about five inches in diameter, fry pan five or six inches in diameter, knife, fork, teaspoon, tablespoon, five-pound hard pan for water, two dozen matches in waterproof container, tooth brush, tooth paste, comb, face towel, dish towel, dish rag, soap, fire iron, shelter canvas pup tent or small tent; bedding, two blankets and one quilt; belt axe, awesaver, overcoat, or mackinaw; grub for six meals, 12 tablespoons sugar, one tablespoon salt, two spoons, one pound butter (in mouse proof can), two small cans, butter beans, two halves bread (in cloth sack), one pint pancake flour, half dozen eggs, two cans soup, three small cans milk, 12 slices bacon, three tablespoons grease in friction top can, one pint jelly or jam, or one-half pint peanut, eight tablespoons quick-cooking starch.

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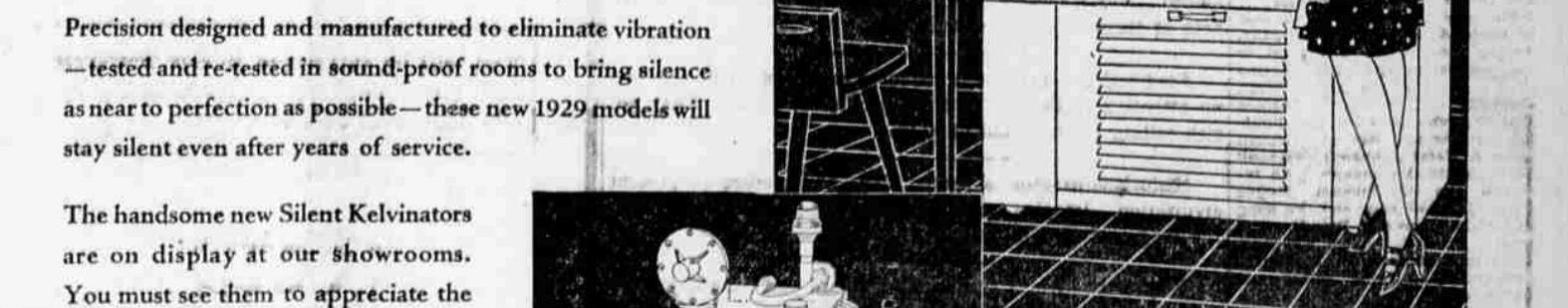
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DIAMOND LK. ROAD OPENED TO TRAVEL
