WILLING KEEPS GOLF TITLE BY DAZZLING PLAY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—D. O. P. Willing, Waverly Club, Pacific Northwest golf sensation, who holds every title of any importance in this section, won the Oregon championship for the fourth time today by a brilliant three and two victory over Don Moss, Alderwood, defending champion, in a par-shattering match.

The match was a fitting climax to a week of everything from snuff to almost perfect golf. With his victory today, Willing becomes a favorite contender in the Pacific Northwest championship.

He won the Pacific Northwest open championship last year and then followed that by topping the field in the Oregon open at Waverly last December. In addition he tied for medalist honors in the Pacific Northwest meet and won the medal round at Alderwood this week. Stamping him as one of the greatest golfers this section has produced.

His superiority on the greens was for him the thrilling final duel today.

Moss staged a great fighting comeback the afternoon round on the final nine after being five down on the twenty-seventh. He won the twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth and thirtieth in a row, the first two with daring putts and the thirtieth when Willing pushed his drive into trouble at the right of the fairway.

On the next hole came the only thing that could be termed the break of the game and it was in Willing's favor. Playing a strong second shot with his wood, the doctor's ball hit the flag squarely and dropped on the green within putting distance of the cup. If the ball had hit the pin, a glancing blow on either side, it probably would have bounded entirely off the green.

That stopped Moss's comeback. Despite the fact that he played a wonderful approach to the green within putting reach of the hole, his putt for a birdie there rimmed the cup. Willing sank his putt for a three and won the hole.

This particular hole meant the difference to Moss between being one down and three down. As it was he was three down and that was too much of a lead to overcome with Willing playing a spectacular brand of golf. The doctor played it safe for the next three holes which were halved and the match ended at the sixteenth.

STATERS TO PLAY EASTERN SQUADS

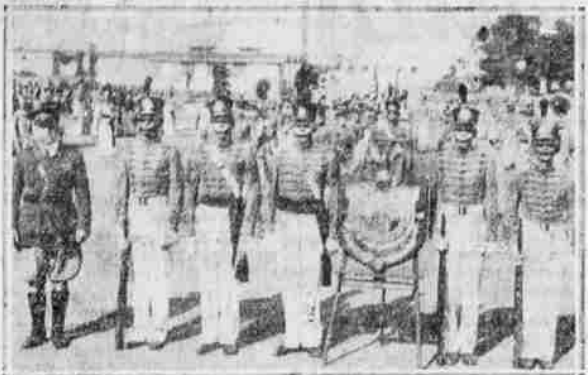
CORVALLIS, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—Fred A. Ladd, general manager of the Oregon State College, announced today the college grid team will play two football games with West Virginia University, the first game in 1929 to be played in Morgantown, Va., Yankee Stadium, New York or Soldier Field, Chicago. The second game in 1931, will be played in Portland.

Oregon State College officials have about completed negotiations with another middle western institution for two more intercollegiate games. If plans go through, the first game will be played in Milwaukie, Wis., and the second in 1931.

The Orangemen were much in demand for intercollegiate this year. Several eastern and southern colleges, among them being University of Florida and Southern Methodist, but Oregon State was forced to decline as they already had killed a game with the University of Detroit.

CHICAGO, June 8.—(AP)—A 26-year-old youth with a shock of brown hair, who started his brilliant career on the circuit path by request, today became the fastest human of the age.
He is George Simpson, a lithic, spindly-legged streak from Ohio State University.
Competing with the fastest field ever brought together in an American meet, this smiling Buckeye streaked down the 100 yard stretch in the national collegiate track and field championship meet on Stagg Field today in 20.2 seconds, clipping one-fifth of a second from the officially recognized world's mark.

Simpson's brilliant performance, aided by his teammates, enabled the State to triumph for the team championship honors.

The Buckeye, winning four of the fifteen events and placing in two others, amassed a total of 50 points, with the University of Washington second with 42.

Illinois, winner of the Big Ten outdoor championship, was third, with 35.1-2, the University of Southern California fourth with 32 and Stanford, winner of the Intercollegiate A. A. A. meet a week ago, fifth with 28. Forty-six of the 85 teams broke into the scoring.

Simpson, in his startling victory, defeated the famous Claude Bracey, the Dixie Flyer from Rich Institute and Eddie Tolson, sensation at night sprinter from the University of Michigan, who twice within two weeks, had run the century in 20.5-10 seconds.

Simpson, putting his heart and soul into every step of the race and running with machine like smoothness, beat Bracey to the tape by a stride, in a heart-breaking finish. Tolson was third, about six feet behind Bracey. The Wolverine never got away to a poor start, was trailing sixth at the half way mark, but finished with a remarkable burst of speed. Simpson put away from the mark like a shot and led from start to finish, with Bracey snapping at his heels.

Officials said there could be no question as to the acceptance of his record. He was timed by five watches. Two of the times caught him in 20.2-10 and three clocked 20.3-10. Engineers immediately measured the track and found it measured 100 yards and one inch.

NEW YORK, June 8.—(AP)—New business reported to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association for the week ended June 1 by mills making soft wood lumber, was six per cent more than the mill's production. Shipments were 20 per cent above production. Hardwood mills reported current orders at four per cent under production and shipments 12 per cent greater.

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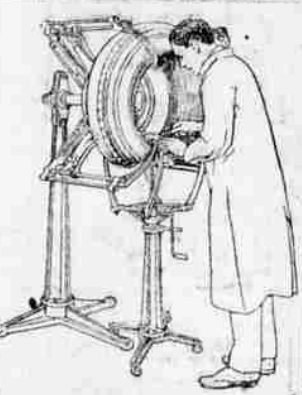
COLVIG DRUG STORE REMODELING BEGUN
