## MEDFORD ROUTE TO ANNA SPRING WILL BE OPENED

Affairs at Crater Lake National park are continuing to move fast in the way of opening the park roads, both by hand power and nature, and in the big work that has been going on there for weeks in the campaign against the pine beetle pest.

Already about 70 men are employed in the park and more will probably be put on later if necessary to get the entrance roads open to the rim by July 1, when the season opens.

Superintendent E. C. Solinsky is expected back from the park tonight or tomorrow, to make further arrangements for this end of the season's opening. Arthur Moen, chief disbursing clerk of the park headquarters, returned to the city Sunday after several days spent at the park looking after pay rolls and other matters. The headquarters will probably be moved from the federal building in Medford to government camp for the season by June 25.

No fresh snow has fallen at the park for days past, but there has been much rain in that time and, while the old snow-croton muck has been melting fast at times, there is still much of it that must disappear before the opening day of the season.

The south, or Klamath, entrance road is now open all the way to Anna Spring camp and this is the only route at present available to reach the lake in motor cars. The east, or Medford, entrance road will probably not be open until tomorrow or the day after.

The rim road is open to a mile and one-half above Lost Creek, the east entrance road.

The forest service crew of 27 pine beetle workers, which has been working in the pine beetle campaign in co-operation with the Crater Lake National park crew, has been moved from a half mile below the east entrance to Lost Creek inside the park.
