

# OFFER REWARD OFFICERS THINK FOR SLAYER OF GUSTAVUS SAW VIRGINIA PATTY MRS. FRANKLIN

### Husband Posts \$2000 to Spur Hunt — Coastwise Search for Tallman Centers in San Francisco — Body Not Identified.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 11.—(AP)—A reward of \$2000 was offered for the arrest of the slayer of his wife, Mrs. Virginia Patty, by Frank D. Pattey, Portland, Ore., investment broker. Announcement of the reward was made after a conference between Pattey and Chief of Detectives Herman Cline last night. Mrs. Patty's body was found in a closet of a rooming house a week ago, tied to a clothes hook and bearing evidence of a severe beating. Testimony at the coroner's inquest indicated the woman had been slain with a brick, and that she had been dead more than two days when the body was discovered.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 11.—(AP)—The coastwise manhunt for William L. Tallman, radio operator suspect in the Los Angeles slaying of Mrs. Virginia Patty, centered in San Francisco today. Search of the S. S. Admiral Benson at Portland, Ore., failed to disclose a trace of the fugitive and authorities believed Tallman either leaped from the vessel in San Francisco bay or walked ashore when the ship was docked. Efforts were still being made to identify a body washed up on a beach here as that of the missing radio operator.

## JACKSONVILLE HEARS DISCUSSION OF WATER

## ST. JOHNS ICE HOLDS COASTWISE VESSELS

ST. JOHN, N. F., June 11.—(AP) The steamer Earl of Devon and several fishing schooners today were fast in a mass of heavy ice extending northward from Cape St. Johns on the northeast coast of Newfoundland. The steamer Clyde reported that it had been forced to turn back at Tilt Cove in Notre Dame bay a few miles south of the cape. The schooner Lady Apersons has not been heard from with five men aboard since she landed four men at the fishing station on Belle Isle. Seven vessels which attempted the outside passage to Labrador were stuck in the ice within sight of shore.

## Accidental Poisoning of Pet Pony Tragic Event for White Children; Harriet Tells Story of Gentle Tony

Here is a real human interest story, so dear to the hearts of most newspaper readers. We all know the tragedy of losing a pet, particularly when the death is caused by poison, accidentally eaten.

The following account of the death of her pet pony and pal "Tony," from eating poison intended for dinner squirrels, was written by Harriet White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. White, who with John G. Mann of this city, own a large ranch four miles west of Phoenix.

We don't believe anyone will be able to read this simple, child-like tale without a catch in the throat, and crowding of youthful memories which demonstrates that one touch of common tragedy, like one touch of nature, makes the whole world kin.

### Faithful Comrade

This morning as I looked out of my bedroom window I saw Prince, a large Shepherd dog, keeping a silent watch over his dead pal, Tony, our saddle pony. Prince has lain there beside his comrade for almost 24 hours to guard off the other stock who might come too near.

It was eight years ago that a man came to our ranch and wanted to sell us a young pony and a small Shepherd pup. Dad bought them, for we needed a dog and a horse for the cattle on the ranch. From that time until yesterday evening Tony has been a faithful servant, going on errands and giving us many pleasant rides through the hills, with Prince always at his side.

There are seven of us children and we all mourn the loss of our dear little Tony. It was but yesterday morning that we looked out and saw Tony with his neck arched and stepping along as easily as possible with the two babies going up the road alone on his back. We were never afraid to leave them alone with him.

Tony was a beautiful little horse, with a dark brown glossy coat, a coal black mane, which was clipped short. He had a white diamond-shaped mark in his forehead. His eyes were such kind and knowing eyes. He always held his head up and his neck arched. He stepped so proud and dignified.

Tony was quite an intelligent horse. He seemed to understand everything we said. If we said, "go get the cows" we would only have to sit here and he would bring them safely to the barn. When he did not want us to catch him he would lay back his ears and turn his back to us. We knew enough then to leave him alone.

Tony was known by the boys and girls for miles around our ranch, who have visited here. Tony was also well known by all the children at school, who loved him and always took a ride when they got a chance.

Daddy had many offers to sell Tony for good prices, but we did not want to part with him.

My last ride was Saturday afternoon when Tony and I went eight glorious miles together. Prince did not go with us, but when we came over the hill at full gallop, Prince came rushing to meet us. Down the road we came, Tony and Prince racing madly.

When I got to the house I handed him to my little sister, Lila, 9 years old. She jumped on his smooth, shiny back and was off to the barn, with Prince at Tony's heels. I watched her as she jumped off and turned him into the barn yard. Little did I realize that that was the last time I was ever to have a ride on Tony.

Then came the shock: At 5 o'clock my brother went to get him for Lila and 4-year-old Gwen, so they could get the cows. There he found Tony, who had in some way opened the door of the milk house and had eaten some squirrel poison which was lying on a table.

Daddy says that he will get us another horse, but he will never get one to take the place of our little Tony.

I hope that some boy or girl who has a pet and thinks as much of it as we did of Tony, will always be careful and not leave any harmful things around so it can get it, or they will lose a loving pet as we did.

## BELIEF GROWS WALES TO WED SWEDE COUSIN

### Expect Announcement Within Next Two Weeks — Names Coupled Before Stay in London Prolonged By Young Princess.

LONDON, June 11.—(AP)—Belief is growing in some quarters here that an announcement of the engagement of the Princess of Wales to Princess Ingrid, daughter of the crown prince of Sweden, may be made within the next two weeks.

Two possible occasions are suggested, the Princess's 35th birthday on June 23, and an elaborate ball which the Swedish embassy has arranged for the beautiful princess June 14.

It is not the first time that there have been rumors that the British heir would marry his 13-year-old second cousin from Viking land, but not before have there been the combination of circumstances and events giving background and lending weight to the reports.

When Princess Ingrid arrived in London May 15 for one of her numerous visits to her grandfather the Duke of Connaught, Uncle of King George, it was stated she would stay only a month. Her plans have been changed and it was understood today she would remain in England until the close of the London season, several weeks hence.

## WELCOME GRANGE AT MYRTLE POINT ANNUAL CONCLAVE

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—More than 1200 delegates and visitors to the 55th annual session of the Oregon State Grange convention were here today to be officially welcomed to Myrtle Point. George Palmeter, state master, received the keys to the city.

On the Coos and Curry county fairgrounds, 300 Grangers were encamped.

Grange policies were outlined today by George Palmeter in the master's address.

The city of Redmond was making a strong bid for the 1930 session, and Klamath Falls and Hood River delegations were backing up bids of their cities. Medford is asking for the 1931 meeting.

## JOSEPH GIFFORD GORED BY BULL

Joseph Gifford, 79, well known talent rancher, is in a serious condition at the Sacred Heart hospital as a result of being gored this forenoon by a vicious bull on the home place. Gifford was found unconscious, lying in the yard near some posts he had been repairing to keep the animal in his lot.

He was found at noon and was immediately rushed to the hospital by the Perl ambulance. One horn had penetrated the chest and his condition this afternoon was thought to be critical.

The bull had threatened to gore others and Gifford was taking special precautions to prevent such happening by attempting to strengthen the fence.
