

# EGG POOLS AND RETURN TO FARMER

## Manager Parker of Farmers Exchange Co-operative Plans Broaden Pool Dealing—Operating Expense Reduced—Klamath Demand Expands—Medford Places Aiding.

Clay D. Parker, manager of the Farmers Exchange Co-operative, plans to broaden the local pool selling and pool buying, in the coming months of his administration, and it will be one of his policies. Mr. Parker completed a year's service as manager June 1, and was re-engaged for a three-year term.

After a year of effort, Manager Parker recently concluded negotiations with the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers, whereby marketing conditions for local eggs and poultry will be improved.

For the past year, payments on egg pools have been made promptly, and the operating expense has been reduced until it is now three cents per dozen, including the egg cases.

The local egg market is now in a healthy condition. The Klamath market has developed, "until it is as big, if not bigger, than the home market," according to a bulletin letter mailed Tuesday.

The bulletin also states: "We are getting better co-operation from Medford hotels and merchants... and day after day we are from 25 to 50 cases short of filling our orders."

Local poultrymen are urged to bring their eggs to the exchange. Improvement in the local egg marketing situation, is set forth in the following letter from E. J. Dixon, general manager of the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers to the Farmers Exchange Co-operative:

"Gentlemen: Replying to your letter of the 11th. Providing it is satisfactory with you we will handle all of the surplus eggs you have. You can pack them under our brand, according to the specifications which we have given you and will give you from time to time. They will be subject to our inspection at either our Eugene or Portland plant, wherever you ship them."

"This will give you a continuous outlet for your eggs in the eastern markets, when they should go east. If you can build up your surplus, which no doubt you can do, you could start a 'cut' at Medford and we could finish loading it either at Eugene or Portland, and you would thereby get advantage of the through rate from Medford to New York, or any other eastern point, which would be the same as the rate from Portland. The loading in transit privilege, in effect now, will permit this. It will be necessary, however, to build up your volume considerably above what it is at the present time. In order to make this saying."

"We will make you proper and sufficient advances, just as soon as the eggs are shipped, and providing they are sold on consignment in the eastern market, we will remit the balance due you promptly. In some cases we will be able to buy your eggs outright. In any case, your members can feel assured as to the financial situation so far as the eggs you send to us are concerned. This, in effect, will give you just about the same arrangement as if your members belonged to this organization here, as far as the eggs you sell outside of your local territory are concerned."

"Hoping this arrangement may stabilize your situation there, we are, very truly yours, PACIFIC CO-OPERATIVE POULTRY PRODUCERS."

# BANCROFT TOSS IN DOUBLE PLAY SAVES PIRATES

## Sour Heave By Robin Player Gives Pirates Respite From Second Place Threat—Giants Defeat Cincinnati By Shutout.

After developing a strange facility for losing ball games to Brooklyn, the Pirates executed a smart about-face at Forbes field yesterday just in time to save themselves from the vicious Robins—and a plunge into second place. Brooklyn had in the making a double-play which would have ended the game in its own favor, but Dave Bancroft slipped off a wry toss to first base for the second half of the intended double-killing, and two Pirate runners scored, winning the game by 3 to 2.

The Pirates remained half a game behind the Cardinals in a games count, but retained first place on a per centage margin, through having played fewer engagements. The Cardinals stepped all over the Phillies, as Hal Hald pitched good ball. Frank Frisch aided Hald with a home run, a triple and two singles, as Frank O'Doul hit his 12th homer for the Phils.

The Giants regained their stride by defeating Cincinnati, 9 to 0, through the second shut-out effort of big Fred Fitzsimmons in four days. The Giants earned an even break in Cincinnati on the victory, and ran their record in the west to eight games won and only three lost.

The clan McGraw now invades Pittsburgh for what shapes up as the most important series of their trip. The Cubs-Braves game at Chicago yesterday was postponed because of rain.

The Yankees took further steps toward converting the American league race into a two-team struggle by winning their third straight game from the Browns, 11 to 5, but the champions gained nothing on the Athletics, who defeated the White Sox by 14 to 3 and retained a lead of seven games.

Young Ed Walsh had another bad day at Philadelphia, and George Earnshaw pitched fine ball over the entire route. Simmons, Fox and Dykes aided the Mackinn game with home runs.

Although the Red Sox outthrew the Tigers by 11 to 7 at the Fenway, but the western team lunched its hits to advantage, winning by 5 to 2.

Washington batsmen went on another rampage behind Fred Marberry to defeat the Indians at the capitol by 12 to 3.

# MARTHA AND HELEN SUFFER SUSPENSION WATER COMPETITION

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP)—The heavy hand of the Amateur Athletic union has fallen on two more Olympic champions, Martha Norellum and Helen Meany.

Found guilty of giving unauthorized exhibitions with professionals Miss Norellum was indefinitely suspended and Miss Meany found "ineligible to compete as an amateur" by the registration committee of the A. A. U. yesterday.

The committee ruled that Miss Norellum, 400-meter free style swimming champion at the last Olympics, must give up all prizes she won at the national women's championship at Chicago.

Specifically the committee charged Miss Norellum with appearing in an unauthorized exhibition with professionals at Miami, Fla., January 2 of this year and at other times and places.

The charges against Miss Meany were similar in character.
