COLUMBIA MINE WILL RESUME OPERATIONS

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 13.—(AP)—Resumption of mining operations at the Columbia mine on Grave creek, one of the largest producers in the county in former years, has been announced by the Bullion Mountain, Inc., company, of British Columbia. The company has purchased the mine from A. L. Lewis of Portland and now has a large crew at work repairing ditches and getting the

mine ready for operation this fall. The Bullion company has taken over seventy per cent of the holdings of Oregon metals, including the Yellowhorn mine, and will develop these. The Columbia, a placer, has turned out more than two million dollars in gold.

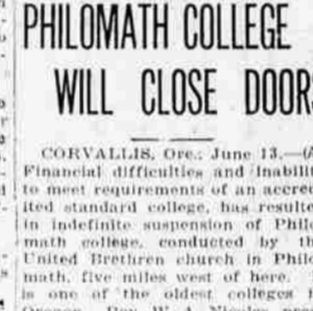
PHILOMATH COLLEGE WILL CLOSE DOORS

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 13.—(AP) Financial difficulties and inability to meet requirements of an accredited standard college, has resulted in indefinite suspension of Philomath college, conducted by the United Brethren church in Philomath, five miles west of here. It is one of the oldest colleges in Oregon. Rev. W. A. Nicolas, president of the college and president of the board of trustees, made the announcement at the conclusion of the annual commencement exercises yesterday. The college was founded in 1865.
