FAST PROGRESS SNOW REMOVAL ON PARK ROADS

Remarkably fast progress has been made this week in the opening of the entrance roads in Crater National park and it appeared today that by tomorrow night the road between Anna Spring camp and government camp will all be cleared of snow by tomorrow evening and would be cleared to the lodge by the middle of next week. If the expectation should be realized of the road being open all the way from the Medford and Klamath entrances to government camp by tomorrow night it would mean that many Medford and Klamath Falls people would drive to government camp Sunday. The fast progress being made seems to assure that the road to the lodge will be open long before the Crater Lake season's opening on July 1. General Manager R. W. Price of the Crater Lake National Park company, following a conference with Superintendent E. C. Solinsky of the park, said today that the first crew of lodge employees would leave Medford for the lodge on June 20 and at the same time the first supplies would be sent up. The outlook now is that the lodge will be all ready to function with a full complement of employees by June 25 or 27. The large number of employees will begin arriving in Medford on the evening of June 18. They come from all parts of the state. Mr. Price, who arrived in the city two days ago and is making his headquarters at the Jackson hotel, will remain until the lodge opens, motoring back and forth frequently between this city and Klamath Falls and the park, making preparations for the season's opening. Superintendent Solinsky is happy over the fast progress being made in getting the park roads open and the outlook that the job will be completed, all except the rim road, much before July 1, and makes almost daily trips between here and Crater Lake park looking after the large crew of men he has at work there. Nature, in the past few days, has been greatly aiding in the work of clearing the roads, as wherever the deep, icy coating is broken and a hole made thawing rapidly ensues. The clearing work is being done by caterpillars, scrapers and snow shoveling by many laborers. The park staff has rigged up a new kind of snow plow, which, if it works as is now anticipated, will greatly hasten the work of clearing the snow between government camp and the lodge.
