## BUNION DERBYISTS ON LAST LAP AND WINNER IN DOUBT

HUNTINGTON PARK, Cal., June 15.—(AP)—Muscles hardened by continuous climbing of mountains, skins bronzed by wind and sun, the survivors of the trans-continental union derby today trailed into this Los Angeles suburb—the winner still in doubt.

With only a single lap to be run, and with more than 3,600 miles of country behind, Fete Gavuzzi, 23-year-old British born Italian, held first place in elapsed time by nine minutes and 56 seconds over John Salo, stocky policeman of Pasadena, N. J., the 26 mile, 3 1/2 yard marathon to be run within Wrigley park, Los Angeles, tomorrow night will decide it.

Gusto Umek, of Italy, won today's lap from San Juan Capistrano, but the battle between Gavuzzi and Salo over the 62 mile stretch to finish in a tie for second place, overshadowed his victory. Umek captured the run in 8 hours, 45 minutes and 50 seconds. Gavuzzi and Salo, fighting to lead each other to the control station, clocked at 9 hours, 51 minutes and 10 seconds.

HUNTINGTON PARK, Cal., June 15.—(AP)—Gusto Umek, of Italy, won the final lap of the trans-continental union derby, a 62-mile run from San Juan Capistrano, today. His time was 8 hours, 45 minutes and 50 seconds. A short jaunt into Los Angeles followed by a 24-mile 3 1/2 yard marathon within Wrigley field tomorrow night will complete the cross-country race.

## LONG SHOT WINS AMERICAN DERBY; VAN DUSEN LAGS

CHICAGO, June 15.—(AP)—Windy City, a game little brown son of Upeel, a 14 to 1 shot in the betting, sent 50,000 racing fans delirious with excitement today by scoring a startling upset in winning the \$50,000 American derby at Washington park.

The triumphant three-year-old, a Chicago horse, owned by a Chicago sportsman, Frederick M. Grabner, won the race at one mile and a quarter in 2:19 over a track that was heavy and slow.

Natchapur, the game California horse that always comes from behind but seldom wins, finished second, a tenth and a half in the rear, just as he did in the Cofroth handicap last winter, and in the Kentucky derby just a month ago.

Thundering along in third place came American, one of three horses owned by the R. T. Wilson-Walter J. Salmon entry. Dr. Freedland, winner of the Preakness, finished fourth.

Clyde Van Dusen, supposedly runner-up of a super-horse, Man O' War, winner of the Kentucky derby, struggled across the finish line eighth in the field of nine starters. This highly played favorite, after leading on to second place for half a mile, with Black Diamond setting the early pace, blew up and quit just before the three quarters was reached.

## ADOPT HOOP SKED FOR N. W. SCHOOLS

SPOKANE, Wash., June 15.—(AP)—After three days thinking and weighing, graduate managers of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference today adopted a four-year rotating basketball schedule which excludes the University of Montana.

The Greatly institution was ousted Thursday when the officials decided that games at Missoula, Montana, forced the other teams in the northern section of the conference to travel too far.

The program, which goes into effect next January, will be used for four years with Oregon and Oregon State colleges, and Idaho and Washington State colleges exchanging schedules, while the University of Washington was given "hub" places. The Hawks will play virtually the same schedule for the four seasons.

The completed schedule gives each team six more games than last year.
