REQUIRE PERMITS FOR CAMP FIRES NATIONAL FOREST

Camp fire permits are now required on the Crater National forest, according to a statement issued today by Hugh B. Rankin, forest supervisor, and may be obtained at the Medford office or from any forest officer, but will be issued only for a definite time and place.

Permits will not be required when safe stoves are used, nor will they be required at the following camps, which have been improved and which are located along heavily used roads: Woodruff Meadows Bridge, Woodruff Meadows, Natural Bridge, Union Creek, Farewell Bend, Castle Creek, Bybee Creek, Brown's Cabin Bridge, Brown's Cabin, Crater Creek, Foster Bridge (Rogue River), National Creek, Haryon, Hamaker R. S. Camp, Hamaker Creek, Minnehaha, Mazama, Rogue River Silver Camp, Warped, Whiskey, Huckleberry, Wagon, Copeland, Dead Indian Soda Springs, Malone Spring, Lake of the Woods (3 camps), Recreation, Crystal Springs, Seven Mile, Wild Cat, Odessa Middle Fork Applegate Bridge Bridge.

These camps will be posted with signs, "Camp fire permits not required at this forest camp." At all other places building of a fire without a permit is prohibited and the requirement will be strictly enforced.

GROWERS DISCUSS PACKING CHARGES FOR ROGUE PEARS

At a joint meeting of the directors of the Fruit Growers league, and members of the packer's committee, held yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Medford, fruit packing charges were discussed for the coming season.

Her Anderson, chairman of the growers' committee, was instructed to prepare a statement defining the standard pack, and after it has been approved will be published. The preparation of the statement is expected to take a week, and it will explain the charges fully.

Packing houses of the valley this season will use the three-way and four-way corduroy pack, generally, as a protective measure against shock and bruises. The pack also includes an excelsior board on top, and beveled ends as further protection. Some of the packers will use curtains on their pack.

Many of the shippers hold to the belief that in order to maintain the present superiority of Medford pears in eastern markets, an attractive pack is paramount, and all agree that the fruit shipments this year will be more pleasing to the eye than ever before in the history of the industry. Many of the fruit wraps of individual growers, will be works of art.

On each box will be printed the word "Medford," and in smaller type will be the words, Oregon, U. S. A. To comply with the British import shipment act. The word "Medford" is emblazoned on the boxes, in accordance with the recent advice of eastern fruit distributors that the trade know the fruit only as Medford, not Southern Oregon or Rogue River valley pears.

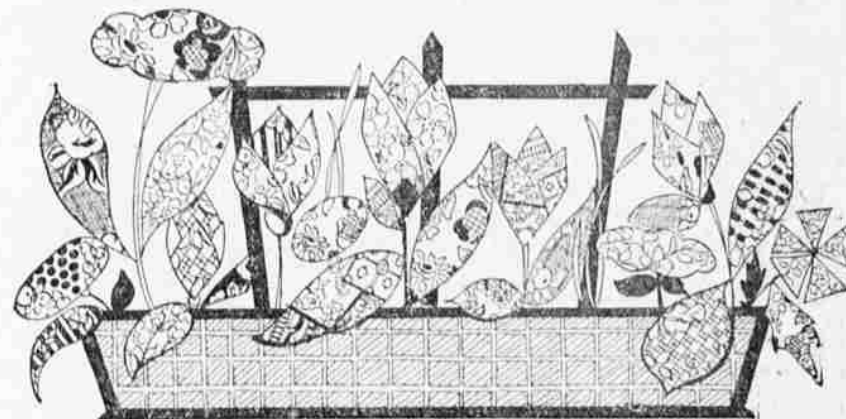

BALLOT FAVORS EARLY CLOSING

Whether or not the stores of Medford should close at six o'clock on Saturday was the question up for discussion at the meeting last evening of the Merchants' association, held at the Hotel Medford.

Following discussion on both sides of the question, an informal vote was taken, which showed that 16 of those present were in favor of the closing, and six opposed. The vote was more or less of a "straw ballot" as several representatives of large establishments were absent.

Carl Swigart, president of the Chamber of Commerce, brought up the merger of the Realty Board, Merchants' association and Chamber of Commerce. A committee, made up of members of each organization was appointed, and it is thought that the three organizations will continue as at present, but co-operate as one organization.

Members of the Merchants' association voted to discontinue meetings until September.

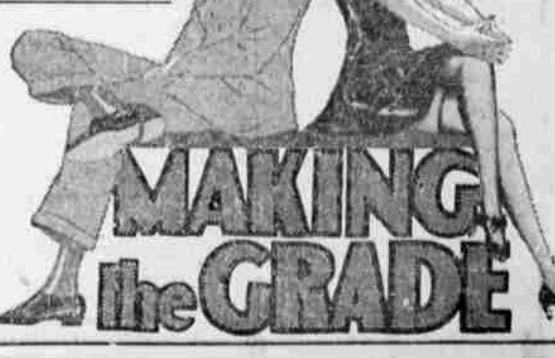
