But after 18 months he was enlisted in the ranks of the Sixth Georgia cavalry, and served throughout the war.

PRESENT HOOVER OREGON LICENSE

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—Charles M. Moore of Portland, son of a pioneer Oregon family and officer of the late company which employed President Hoover as officer in flight, soon will be placed in operation.
