

SOLONS AGAIN SURRENDER TO ATHLETIC JINX

Mackmen Make it 13 Wins in 14 Starts Against Johnson's Crew—Robins On Warpath Against Giants, Take Double Bill

It is difficult to believe that any mere statute on the books could protect the senators from the Athletics. It happened again yesterday at Washington in full view of a hardy band of capital fans—thirteen victories for the Mackmen in fourteen starts against Walter Johnson's men. If this is carried far enough, it may easily mean the margin by which the Athletics defeat the Yankees, presuming always that they do defeat the Yankees.

The score of this latest outrage against Clark Griffith's peace of mind was 7 to 6, and the Senators threatened to the very last to pull it out. The home forces did have the satisfaction of seeing Robert M. Grove, star left hander of the American League making an unglorified exit after the second inning, but Rube Walberg was in there when the pay-off took place. The customary parade of Washington pitchers marched through the box, headed by Hadley.

The victory netted the Athletics a gain of half a game over the Yankees, who trail by eight full games again. The champions got no better than an even break against the Red Sox, despite the presence of Babe Ruth in the field—on the bench. Freddy Holmanch exercised his customary spell over the Bostonians in the opener to win by 9 to 6, but Dippner, Zachary and Sherid shot the chutes in the nightcap, which Boston won by 7 to 4. Lou Gehrig hit his 15th home run in the opener, holding his tie with Hafey of the Cardinals, who broke out with a round trip blow at Chicago. Other teams in the American league were idle.

Inspired no doubt by the loose conduct of the Braves who brazenly took two one-run decisions from the Cardinals at St. Louis on Sunday, the roaring Robins hit the warpath at a most inopportune moment for the Giants. Not satisfied with winning the first game by 8 to 7, the Flatbush flock came right back in the second to win by 7 to 6 on home runs by Rube Bressler and Babe Herman in the eighth and ninth respectively.

The first game witnessed the rout of both Larry Benton and Dazzy Vance. John Morrison did a fair job of finishing for the Robins, but the Giant pitching remained indifferent. Melvin Ott hit his 15th homer, and Bill Terry also hit for the circuit. Bill got nine out of 10 in the two games, hitting his average to .400 and himself to the league lead.

The Giants were not the only contending team to run into trouble yesterday. Red Lucas outpitched Irvin Brame at Cincinnati to shade Pittsburgh by 2 to 1 and the Cubs thumped the Cardinals by 12 to 5 at Chicago. As Hack Wilson hit two homers, the round of results left the Cardinals holding a three-point lead and their heads. The Pirates were second, three points ahead of the Cubs.

The 4 to 2 victory of the Phillies over the Braves was notable chiefly for the 17th home run of Charley Klein, the slugging outfielder of the Philadelphia team. Lester Sewell pitched smart ball against Ben Cantwell and Leverett.

ANOTHER CHANCE AGAINST B. KRUSE SOUGHT BY JACK

If Bob Kruse, Portland wrestler, ever worked to win a match he went through all the motions when he defeated Jack Romona, Los Angeles, two out of three falls at the armory last night before a good-sized crowd. Romona, who defeated Ira Dern of Salt Lake City only a short time ago, seemed to have the edge on the match until Kruse, after ten minutes of wrestling, took the third fall with a leg strangle.

However, Romona was not convinced Kruse is the better man and has challenged Kruse to a return match, which will probably be held next week.

Romona, like Kruse, is young, but appeared to have more science than his opponent. Kruse spent most of his time attempting to break away from holds, but now and then clamped a punishing hold on the Los Angeles man, who usually broke away in quick order. Bob did not resort to as much roughness as in other matches. He was thrown out of the ring two or three times and found great joy in crawling to the ropes, especially when he was made the victim of a toe hold.

Kruse won the first fall in 17 minutes, lost the second in 17 minutes and won the third in 19 minutes.

In the special event, Sailor Jack Wood found himself up against a harder man than he had expected when Joe Ferguson of Evansville, Ind., took a fall from him in nine minutes. Ferguson, a fighter by trade, displayed good wrestling skill and at times flashes of acrobatics. Ferguson wants to meet Gene O'Grady of Ashland in a 10-round fight, but O'Grady is said to be a bit backward about accepting.

In the preliminary, Indian Joe Corbett of Roseburg wrestled a draw with Bummy Powell of Medford. The boys were evenly matched.
