NEW YORK—America's metropolis has been pictured as either a Sodom or Gomorrah, given up to passion revelry or a fashion-mad city of whims which long ago discarded its traditions because they were old.

There is, however, another side which may be seen by visiting the Church of the Heavenly Rest, which is moving into a new parish house across from Mrs. Andrew Carnegie's Fifth Avenue mansion, may be considered typical.

Church Workers
Ellis Root attends the Church of the Heavenly Rest, and so, too, does Frank L. Polk, former under secretary of state. The congregation is one of the wealthiest in the city and includes a number of Wall Street brokers among them. Charles C. Michalis.

Michalis makes a lobby of collecting stained glass and therefore was called into consultation when windows were designed for the new office. So interested was he that he also agreed to take charge of the church's outfitting with furniture. The other day he notified the rector, Rev. Henry Darlington, that he had just spent a week away from his office, sitting day after day in news and chair so that he could report from personal experience which types were the most comfortable.

Bootleggers Disturbed
Reverting to the secular side of city life, one finds the beverage situation a little upset by the threat of heavier penalties under the new Jones act. It has been reported that a number of bootleggers are getting out of the racket to keep their fortunes intact and personal freedom secure. Others have boosted their prices and some, to avoid capture in the act of transporting their wares, have discontinued delivery of case goods, informing customers that hereafter the buyer himself must cart away the purchase.

Admittance to speakeries has become even more difficult than formerly. The cards they handed out on a previous visit are questioning the bootleggers whose faces they have forgotten. Screen Life Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD—While directors, actors and practically everyone else connected with movie studios face new problems arising from the talkies, time might be taken out now to consider how the new screen era has affected the work of those who write the movies—the screenwriters.

Not only has the frequent call for two complete versions—talking and silent—of each story increased their labor, but now they are in the very front line trenches of the movie-making battle.

In the days of golden silence on the screen, the screenwriter prepared the script or "continuity" for a picture at ease in the knowledge that director, title writer, editor, cutter and almost everyone else with a hand in its progress to completed form probably would alter his work as the film went through the mill, and there finally would be an opportunity to survey the finished picture before release and make further changes himself if necessary.

Now, for a talkie, the script simply must be perfect before it leaves the screenwriter's hands. He knows that what he writes must represent the picture in its ultimate form. A talkie has no subtitles which can be revised to correct a weak point, and the "cutting" of scenes with dialog offers obvious difficulties aside from the waste involved in the expensive recording of lines not to be used.

The added responsibility, as any screenwriter can testify, is no light burden.

New Tricks
Writing for the talkies, too, is of course vastly different from the old silent screen job. Screenwriters have had to learn to write with a figurative stop-watch before them. Each scene, each line of dialog, each pause in the characters' conversation, must be noted "timed" as for the stage.

The writer must keep that in mind as he frames the speeches to come from the actors' lips.

And as a picture usually runs approximately half the time occupied by a stage play, there is not the same freedom in dialog writing that the stage dramatist enjoys. "Holding down" conversation, conveying the ideas naturally and effectively without producing "jerky" lines is constant.

That may be why some of the stage playwrights imported to write dialog have found equally badly with some Hollywood screenwriters who could not adapt themselves to the new talkie requirements.
