

EARWIG ARMY HAS CAMP ON HOLLY STREET

Earwigs, dreaded insects which overlook nothing in their depredations, were found today in a new section of Medford, after having been discovered a short time ago on South Ivy street near the old Free Methodist church property. Insects found on Holly street were displayed in a bottle this forenoon by Elmer Oatman, county fruit inspector, placed in charge of a county survey.

However, the survey has hardly begun, and it is Mr. Oatman's plan to employ four or five men to begin an active search for earwigs the first of next week, if not earlier. He also plans to place earwigs on exhibition in various establishments about the city, giving local residents not familiar with the bug an opportunity to become acquainted and not become alarmed if they see strange insects which are not earwigs.

Medford property owners as well as residents in all sections of the county, thinking they have discovered the insects, are requested to place several in a bottle and refer same at once to Mr. Oatman. Earwigs are one of the most destructive insects known, resembling a dwarfed cockroach, and if once seen are never again mistaken for anything else. Their operations even extend to clothes hanging out on lines, Mr. Oatman relating several instances in Port-

BISHOP SAYS PAPERS HINDER ENFORCEMENT

RICHMOND, Va., June 20.—(AP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, believes the country needs a nation-wide chain of newspapers to uphold law enforcement. In a speech here last night before a district convention of his church he described what he termed the attitude of "deliberate misrepresentation" on the part of the secular press of the country toward prohibition enforcement and what he said was its "positive refusal" to support President Hoover's appeal for respect for the dry law.

CULT HEAD TELLS FLOCK OF SINFUL EUROPEAN PEOPLE

CHICAGO, June 20.—(AP)—Four months travel in 16 foreign countries has not shaken Wilbur Glenn Voliva's conviction that all men are sinners. "But in Europe they are worse than in America," declared the overseer of Zion City, religious cult, on his arrival here. "The drinking by men, women and children is shameful. Why, I saw women with the whites of their eyes actually cooked by alcohol."

The crowd standing in the heat and dirt of the station listening to the religious leader gave some evidence of incredulity, and one man standing near Mr. Voliva gave voice to his doubts. "That's no exaggeration, that's a fact," Voliva assured him. "The conditions are such across the waters that missionaries will be sent out from Zion City, he said. Countries selected by the overseer of the cult include Holland, Poland, Scotland, Egypt, Palestine and Syria.

TOURISTS TRUDGE TO RIM OF LAKE SPITE OF SLUSH

Although the rain and snow have ceased at Crater Lake National park, and the past two days there have been fine ones, the work of clearing off the snow from the road between Government camp and the lodge, which had been fast progressing, came to a stop yesterday morning when the big caterpillar broke down and although new repair parts were wired for from Portland or San Francisco, they may not be here for several days.

This makes the situation doubtful as to having that road cleared of snow all the way to the rim by next Saturday evening, unless Superintendent E. C. Solinsky puts his entire crew of labor at the park to shoveling snow.

Despite the fact that the going is sloppy, many tourists and local citizens are visiting the lake rim daily, driving their cars to some distance above Government camp and then trudging through the snow and slush about three-quarters of a mile up the hill to the rim.

An odd sight is to see the tourists, who are not dressed for such a trip, especially the women, trudging through this very wet slush in low shoes and silk stockings. The walk up the hill to the rim is not so bad early in the mornings, because the slush freezes over during the night sufficiently for one to walk upon the crust.

The snow and slush are from one to four feet deep and the past two days it has been melting fast. Many local parties are planning to drive next Sunday as far above Government camp as possible, and then, if necessary, tramp through the slush to the rim to feast their eyes again on Crater lake.

The first crew of employees left the city this morning.

Fort Hubbard, park ranger, and George (Mule) Gould, truck driver, arrived here yesterday from the park and will return this evening or tomorrow. Superintendent Solinsky has been at the park for the past two days.

TOFT'S PROPERTY, FOUNTAIN LODGE, SOLD TO HUTTON

An important real estate transaction in the western fringe of the business district was consummated today when the Fountain lodge property directly opposite the city park and located at the corner of West Main and Ivy streets between the Hotel Medford and the University club was purchased by Ray H. Toft, owner, by Harry Hutton, lessee and manager of the Hotel Medford. The consideration was not given out, but it is understood to have been well up in the thousands. Possession is given July 1.

Mr. Hutton says he bought it simply as a good business investment, and regards it as a cracker-jack one, as the more he has seen of Medford since he has been a resident here for the past year and a half, the more firmly he is convinced of Medford's future growth and prosperity. He regards himself as extremely fortunate in being able to get hold of such a fine, located property. The property fronts 150 feet on Ivy street and 130 feet on West Main.

For the present Mr. Hutton says the Fountain lodge, which is the former home of Dr. and Mrs. E. B. Fickel, will continue to be operated as a first class rooming house, as it has been by Mr. and Mrs. Toft. Inasmuch as the location is a very desirable one for a business structure, apartment house or even for a downtown residence, the property, it is generally thought, will not be devoted very long to rooming house use.

Mr. Toft, of course, will continue to reside in Medford, and from July 1 on will devote his entire time to the Medford Bordered Warehouse, which he owns, and to his real estate holdings in Jacksonville, some 20 pieces.

Mr. and Mrs. Toft plan to buy or build a residence in Medford in the very near future.

NEW YORK, June 20.—(AP)—The recovery in stock prices was resumed today after an early period of heaviness, as a result of the growing speculative belief that the mid-year credit stringency will be considerably less severe than expected and that a gradual easing of credit conditions is in prospect after the turn of the month. Pools resumed operations with confidence in a select assortment of public utility, food, chain store, automotive and electric equipment shares, a dozen of which were lifted to new high levels for the year.
