

MARY PICKFORD REALLY ARRIVES IN LATEST FILM

Mary Pickford has always been a popular favorite in Medford and Jackson county, so no one was surprised that a crowded house greeted her in "Coquette" at the Criterion last night.

And, needless to say, it was a new Mary. Unlike Samson, the ordeal of having her hair oiled, instead of taking away her strength, increased it. No only her strength, but her dramatic power, and her abilities as an actress.

In fact, in our judgment, this all talk "Coquette" marks Mary Pickford as one of the outstanding emotional actresses of this generation. We have never seen anything finer, on the screen or on the legitimate stage, than her treatment of that death scene in this poignant play of modern southern life.

What a temptation for bathos and overacting! How difficult to maintain just the proper note, necessary to transform what poorly handled, was more self-stuff, into genuine heart-breaking tragedy.

And her love making, too. To depict genuine feeling, not the fake movie variety is an art, and the mature Mary Pickford has mastered that art.

The only criticism of the production last night that we could make was what seemed to us an imperfection in the sound reproduction, at any rate it was not easy at times to catch all the words.

Incidentally, there is beautiful photography in "Coquette," excellent support and, most refreshing to us, the original play has not been distorted and sugar coated to satisfy the so-called demands of the box office.

With that colored classic, "Hearts of Dixie," the first of the week and "Coquette" the latter part, the George Hunt company is certainly giving the local movie public the very best that the season in current films offers.

"K. S.—Chic Sale," by the folks coming on the "Coquette" bill, as an item, was Raymond Griffith in his bridge burglar, stunt with the inevitable Stepin Fetchit, which is crying a great deal.

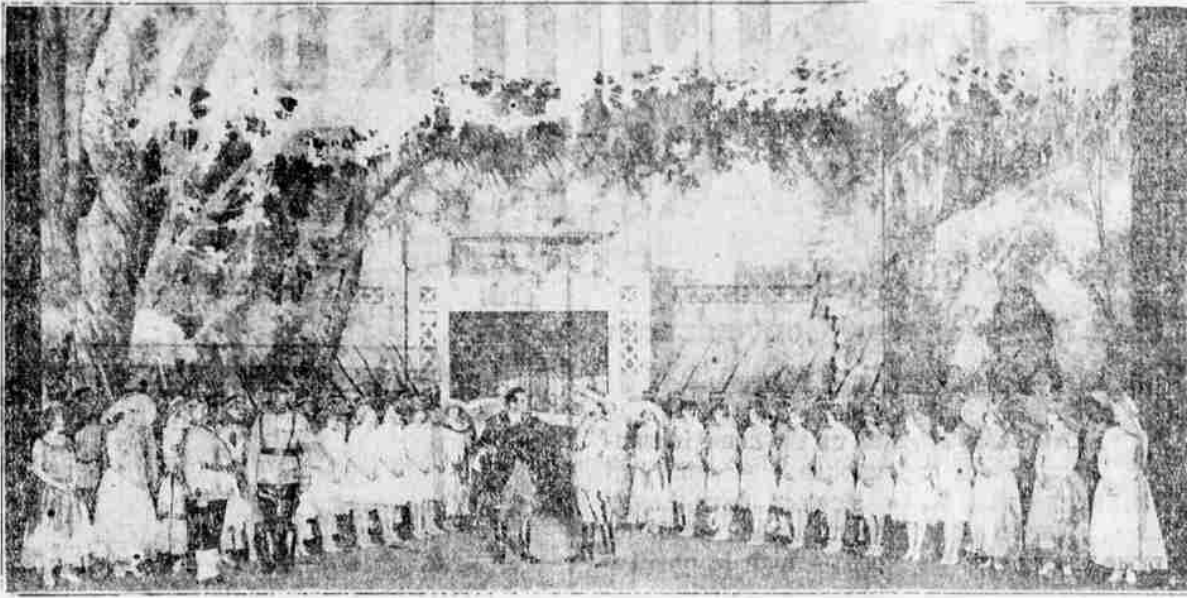

FORT MYERS, Fla., June 20.—(AP)—Before a court of his own people, at the annual dance of green corn today, Josie Billy, Seminole Indian medicine man, without the aid of an alienist or psychiatrist, will answer a charge of slaying Nuf-Che, widowed squaw, with a plea that he was temporarily insane while under the influence of liquor.

Deep in the Everglades, the tribe has gathered to celebrate this festival and to try the medicine man who in the past has set a judgment upon his fellows.

Whatever the verdict, and it may be death or trial by fire, it will be executed summarily, and without interference from the white men, for the courts have taken no action in the case. Seminole law has long taken precedence over Florida jurisdiction, for prosecutors have found the tribal language and customs an insurmountable barrier.
