

COURT HOUSE SITE INTERESTS COUNTY TIDINGS CONTENTS

Medford folks seem to be getting all excited about the location of the new county court house and we want to call attention to the fact that it is NOT a Medford institution, but rather it is a COUNTY court house, and as such not solely the benefit to Medford, but rather the convenience of the remainder of the county should be given some consideration.

There are sites galore being offered, it would seem. The Medford city hall is at present serving as the county court house. When the removal of the court house from Jacksonville to Medford was finally accomplished, there were some strings tied to the deal. Medford was to furnish temporary quarters for the county officers to serve until the new court house was built. Medford is also to furnish the site for the new court house—the county court of course to pass judgment on the site before final acceptance.

The Medford city hall was constructed to meet the first provision and has furnished excellent quarters for the county officers. Now the problem of a site has come up and must be solved. Opinions vary widely. Half a dozen or more sites have been suggested.

Now the county court house will do a bigger out-of-town business than any mercantile establishment in Medford. It will draw a multitude of out-of-town folks to the city, for it is a COUNTY institution and the business of the COUNTY and not Medford alone will be carried on within its portals.

Therefore one of the major needs to be considered in the selection of a site for the building is parking space for automobiles. Any site which does not furnish ample parking space, or is in the least bit inconvenient to reach, should not be considered.

This would eliminate the sites in the heart of Medford.

HUGE DYNAMITE BLAST ON DEAD INDIAN ROAD

About noon today 13,400 pounds of dynamite was fired by electricity at the Jackson county quarry on the Dead Indian road, 19 miles northwest of Ashland. There were two 80-foot tunnels drilled into the quarry, with four tons on each, making 16 blasts in all. They were exploded simultaneously by electricity and were expected to yield 2,100 cubic yards of rock to material.

The work was in charge of Paul Hyanning, county surveyor, and L. V. Tice, representing the Giant Powder company, assisting in arranging the dynamite.
