

ROAD TO CRATER RIM NOW OPEN; MANY TO VISIT

The Crater lake season opens week from tomorrow, the road from Medford and Klamath Falls to the Crater National park is now all cleared of snow all the way to the lake, that result having been reached late yesterday afternoon, and arrangements are fast being completed by the Crater National park company for the opening of the big lodge.

Hundreds of Medford and other valley people and many tourists will drive up to the national park today to see the lake. The old road between government camp and the lake rim is the one which is open now as far as the rim, as because of the many tourists and others visiting the park for a week or two past and having to walk over the snow and slush quite a distance to get to the lake. Superintendent Solsky thought it best to open the old road first, it having less snow on it to be cleared, than the new road between government camp and the rim.

The work of clearing off the new road will be begun at once and will be completed before next Saturday.

The second large crew of lodge help, to augment the first or clean-up crew that left for the lodge last week, will go up from Medford next Tuesday, and other additional crews will depart for the lodge from then on until all the eighty some-odd employees are at work.

The winter headquarters offices of Crater National park in the federal building here will be moved to the park for the season by the middle of this week, Superintendent Solsky having given instructions yesterday to the office force to at once begin packing up the office records and equipment.

By next Saturday night it is expected that the park and the lodge will be all ready to entertain all comers.

EXPECT AIRPORT TO BE FINISHED WITHIN 70 DAYS

Matters in the way of construction of the new airport have been progressing fast for some time past and still are, but the task is such a huge one that it will probably be 70 days before the task is finished.

The work of digging the ditches and laying the tile for drainage of the huge field was begun yesterday, as was also the work of laying the foundation for the hangar and administration building, both of which jobs are being done by the city itself with City Engineer Fred Scheffel in charge of the work. It will take about 30 days to complete this drainage work, and about two weeks for the foundation work.

Architect Frank Clark will have his plans and specifications for the administration and hangar structures completed the first of this week, and bids will then be invited for the carpentry, plumbing and other work on these structures.

MILLARD REPORTS DEALS IN REALTY

The following real estate transactions were handled during the last ten days through the office of P. L. Millard:

The Harry Case home and four lots in the Laurelhurst addition was sold to P. W. Haley of Central Point. Consideration \$1,700. Mr. Haley is modernizing the place and has carpenters and plumbers already at work.

A small house and 2 1/2 lots belonging to Mrs. B. E. Rowley was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Wright, who have moved in with their family, coming from another state.

Twenty acres of fine alfalfa land was exchanged from Hollie Swingle to H. C. Mechem. This tract is located just east of Phoenix. The consideration was \$4,000. Several other small deals include a 1-acre tract and small house on the Old Stage Road to recent arrivals from Nebraska and several lots and summer home tracts on Rogue river.

CARKIN RETURNS FROM BANK MEET

City Attorney John H. Carkin arrived home last Thursday from attending the state bankers association convention the forepart of last week, as a member of the new state tax commission, and during which he made an address on the tax situation, saying in part:

"Taxation is a thing which can be done correctly only after careful study and investigation, by practical application and by educating the people. The tax commission has five major items before it, the excise, the inheritance, the income taxes, a full-time tax commission and centralized control of assessments. All are not pleasing to Oregonians, but this state now stands at a critical point and co-operation is necessary."

GUARDSMEN BACK FROM CAMP SAT.

The Medford units of the Oregon National Guard Company A and the headquarters company, completing their tour of duty at Camp Clatsop, will arrive home next Friday or Saturday from Camp Clatsop for which destination they left for the state encampment in a special train on Tuesday, June 11.

It is understood that the encampment at Camp Clatsop will break up next Thursday afternoon or Friday, and that the troops will at once then depart for home.
