Letters Written by Pioneer of Lane Shown Here
 A number of yellow pages—letters written by Elijah Bristow, the first settler in Lane county, and well known character in Oregon history, were brought to Medford this week by his grand-son, P. L. Bristow, father of Mrs. W. B. Shelley, who is visiting here en route to his home in Oakland, Cal.

These, along with numerous other documents and belongings of the pioneer character, who crossed the plains in 1842, are being transported by Mr. Bristow from Eugene, his former home, to Oakland.

Elijah Bristow not only built the first house in Lane county on a 640-acre donation claim, but donated 40 acres of his land for the building of the first public school house. He also organized the first Christian church on the coast, and enters frequently into the historical accounts of the formation of the first county government in his locality.

In 1847, after he had "discovered" Lane county, he sat down and wrote 13 letters all at one time. One to his wife and one each of his 12 children, who were still back in their home in Illinois, telling them that he had discovered an inevitable paradise and asking them to make haste and join him. He wrote the letters in the spring of the year. They were carried back by ox team and reached their destination in the fall of the year.

The family started out in April, 1848, and reached Medford in their new home on October 3 in those days. Among the many belongings Mr. Bristow now has, is a large black walnut chest in which many of the family belongings were packed on the trip across the plains.

A receipt for taxes paid on land owned by Elijah Bristow in the state of Tennessee in the year 1815, and a piece of the flax used by his wife on her spinning wheel are among the many interesting contents in the old chest. The taxes on the Tennessee property amounted to 93 cents for that year.

In one of his letters home written while he was crossing the plains in 1842, Elijah Bristow speaks of going out one evening with his ox team and with 17 barrels to a place at night and one of them is extracted 26 pounds of talow.

Mr. Bristow will be joined here within a few days by Mrs. Bristow, who is still in Eugene, and together they will leave for their home in Oakland.
