## DOLP WINS GOLF TITLE WITH EASE O'ER MC NAUGHTON

SEATTLE, June 22.—(AP)—Frank Dolp of Portland led his youthful opponent, Malcolm MacNaughton, of the same city, ten up and only 15 holes to play in their 18-hole final match today for the Pacific Northwest Golf association championship. In the women's final Mrs. Vera Hutchings of Vancouver, B. C. was leading Mrs. S. C. Sweeney one up at the fourth hole. MacNaughton was able to win only two holes—the sixth and the eighteenth—on the morning round, while Dolp captured eight. On the second round, Dolp, playing his usual steady game, won the tenth with a birdie for the 14th in par, the sixteenth in a birdie four and the seventeenth in par to make him seven up.

He dropped one of the holes, however, at the eighteenth when he missed a four foot putt for a hole. The Portland youngster, who had played golf only three and a half years, studded down a hill on the last nine, but bucked up against two birdies. Their cards for the last nine were as follows: In par 554 443 524—27. Dolp 454 443 435—34. MacNaughton 544 473 542—39. After making the turn one down to Mrs. Sweeney, Mrs. Hutchings squared their match at the eleventh with a par 5 while the defending champion was taking a seven. Mrs. Sweeney came right back to take the next hole and the lead again with a par four. She won the fifteenth with a par 3 but lost the seventeenth to a par 3. The women halted the sixteenth in five and Mrs. Sweeney went to lunch with a one hole lead in their 24-hole match.

In the two biggest meets of the tournament, MacNaughton disposed of Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, 1928 champion, in the quarter final Thursday and eliminated the veteran, Chandler Egan of Medford, Ore., in the semi-finals yesterday. Announcedly suffering from stage fright before the largest gallery to ever witness a golf match in Seattle, the youngster slowly slipped out of the picture under the marvellous machine-like stroking of the "red hot bird" Dolp. Approximately 3,500 persons gathered at the stadium tonight to watch the men and women final.

California has rowed only one early season race, a victory over Washington, but looks as particularly formidable with seven of the eight oarsmen who carried the Golden Bears to victory here last year to later triumphs at the Olympic try-outs in Philadelphia and at the Olympic games.

David I. McCormick, superintendent of the Indiana battle flag commission, celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary on the day of President Hoover's inauguration.

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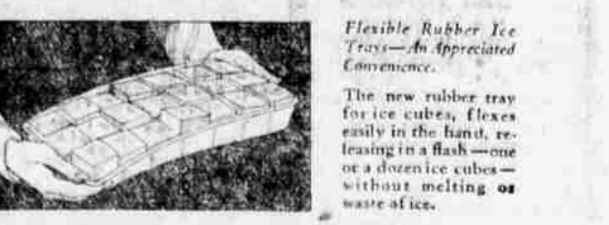
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
