15 TEXAS FELONS STILL AT LIBERTY BRAZORIA, Texas, June 22.—(AP)—With 28 of the 43 convicts who escaped from the Clemens state prison farm early Thursday accounted for, Texas rangers were called on today to add in the search for the 15 men still at liberty. The body of S. W. Martin, convicted-at El Paso for forgery, was recovered from the San Bernard river yesterday. It was believed he drowned in an attempt to swim the stream. Four other convicts were wounded, two seriously, when they were recaptured. The other recaptured prisoners are held in close confinement.
