He was born at Mc Hope, New York, August 16th, 1844. At the age of three years, moved with his parents to Wisconsin. In 1878 was married to Elvina Talbert, to the union two sons were born, Elmer and Claude, who now reside in the East. He was a kind, helpful and his friends and indeed feel the loss. Funeral services will be conducted from the Congregational parsonage Wednesday June 26th at 2:30 p. m. Interment will be made in the Jacksonville cemetery.

LOOKER—William Henry Looker passed away at Community hospital in Medford, Ore., Sunday evening, June 23, at the age of 72 years, two months and nine days, as the result of a complicated heart ailment of several years' standing. The deceased was born in New Richmond, near Mendocino, Pa., April 14, 1857. His ancestors are among the early pioneers of New York and Pennsylvania. His parents, efforts and marked ability along structural and mechanical lines, coupled with individuality of ideas, gained for him, even as a young man, recognition in those fields. Removing to Omaha, Neb., at about the age of majority, he became identified with the meat packing industry, a business which he followed for nearly 40 years. He assisted in the construction and later the operation of one of the first packing plants in Omaha, known as the Harris & Pieser plant. In later years he superintended the construction of the R. Hurst independent plant at Sioux City, Iowa, and for a long period was superintendent of operations of that plant. Afterwards, he and three others organized and built the present plant of the Lincoln Packing company at Lincoln, Neb., which he operated as superintendent for a number of years. He again joined the R. Hurst organization at Sioux City as superintendent, where he remained for a long time, when failing health caused him to withdraw from the business which he had followed for so many years. The local organization formed the nucleus for the present Swift & Co. operations of Sioux City. Mr. Looker's firm adherence to and practical application of the golden rule in all of his activities of the past will have reverberated memories among those who came to know him well. The deceased came to Medford a little less than a year ago, where he had resided with his son, His illness, however, had prevented him from following any particular activity or becoming actively acquainted here. He had been a member of the Masonic order since 1894. He is survived by his widow, a son, W. J. Looker, of Medford, Ore., a daughter, Mrs. L. C. Johnson of Sioux City, Iowa, a granddaughter, Mrs. Louis P. Smith, and a great grandson, three children, the following in order: J. C. Looker, Bradford, Pa.; R. E. Looker, Still Lake, Wis.; Mrs. John Tracy, Bradford, Pa.; Mrs. Helen Lee, Mason City, Iowa; Mrs. May C. Limes, Sioux City, Iowa.
