

# MACKS PUSH ON FOR INCREASED SAFETY MARGIN

## Athletics Now Holding Ten Game Lead Over Champs—Brooklyn Robins Hand Giants Double Defeat—Phillies Win One.

Through a fall in the battle General McGillicuddy refused to quit fighting. With the Yankees still in a Washington rain yesterday, the Athletics fell upon the helpless Red Sox for two victories, 7 to 1 and 8 to 2, increasing their lead over the champions to 10 full games. It often has been pointed out that an advantage for one contender over another in the games won column is of dubious value unless matched by a substantial margin in the lost column, but the fact remains that the Mackmen have reached the magic lead of 10 games for the first time since 1914.

Teams have been known to fall short of a pennant after topping the field by 10 contests, but such instances are rare. There are perhaps no more than two such cases in the history of organized baseball, which dates back to 1876.

John Grove registered his 12th victory of the season in the first half of the Philadelphia double-header, while young Bill Shores, neophyte right-hander, turned in his first full game of the year in the second. Grove allowed just six hits and Shores eight.

The Detroit Tigers conducted themselves precisely enough for six innings at Navin field, only to fall upon Ed Walsh and the unsuspecting White Sox for 11 runs in the seventh. The Tigers won by 14 to 2.

Cleveland and St. Louis divided a double-header at Sportsman's park to complete the American League program. The Indians came from behind to take the opener by 10 to 7, and this so infuriated the Browns that they won the second

# MASTRO DEFEATS LA BARBA IN FAST TEN ROUND BOUT

Reserving himself for the defeat at the hands of LaBarba here nearly a year ago, Mastro scored a brilliant decision over his more rugged rival in ten dazzling rounds. Some ringsters thought LaBarba held the Chicagoan to a draw, but the majority favored Mastro in at least five rounds.

The fight was a hammer and tongs affair from the opening bell, with the midges setting a terrific pace. As they went into the tenth the decision was still hanging fire, but Mastro staged a whitewind, two-fisted attack that gave him victory. The Chicago youth landed the cleaner punches, and he fought a beautiful battle throughout by win.

Some packers also believe that by using curtains which will add one and one-half cents to two cents per box to the cost of packing, a higher price can be obtained on this practice, however, should be discouraged as a general rule, where not necessary in order to meet demands of buyers.

# Name Arbitrators

At the time this report was adopted in March, a resolution was introduced and adopted authorizing the president of the Fruit Growers' league to appoint a committee of fruit growers to sit jointly with a like committee appointed by the packers for the purpose of adjusting, arbitrating or clarifying any misunderstandings or disagreements that might arise during the packing season of 1929 over the construction or interpretation of this packing agreement. This joint committee has been appointed and consists of the following fruit growers and packers: Albert Burch, Steven Nye, W. E. Brayton, C. C. Lemmon, J. E. Edmiston, T. S. Coe and R. R. Reter.

David Rosenberg of the Fruit Growers' league is to act as chairman of this committee, and take part in its deliberations.

The Fruit Growers' league in its 15 years of existence in the Rogue River valley, has been the largest single factor in guiding the fruit industry through its years of initial growth and development down to the present time, when we find the industry reaching a condition of greater stability and surer and more consistent profits. This organization has earned the confidence of every grower in the valley and should receive his hearty support and cooperation.

The league as an organization is endeavoring to help the individual grower to meet his problem in a practical way, therefore the individual grower should give the utmost loyalty to the league, which represents the industry in which he is engaged.

This statement will be published in the daily press, and we respectfully urge each grower to cut this statement out for future reference, and when he makes a contract with his packer for the season of 1929, he should find out before signing a contract exactly what his packing charges will be, and if not satisfied, report to this joint committee. And if he does not thoroughly understand the nature of the agreement negotiated with the packers, he is asked to take the matter up directly with this committee for interpretation and clarification. Only by this method of close co-operation can the league keep in close touch with the packing and marketing situation for this season. If the growers will co-operate in the manner we have indicated, the league will then have the information and knowledge to give greater service to the growers for the year 1929.

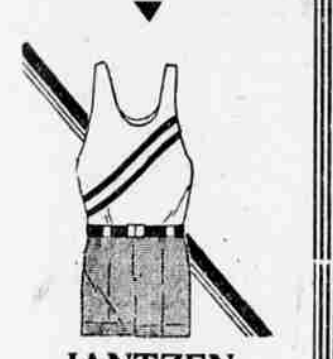
