

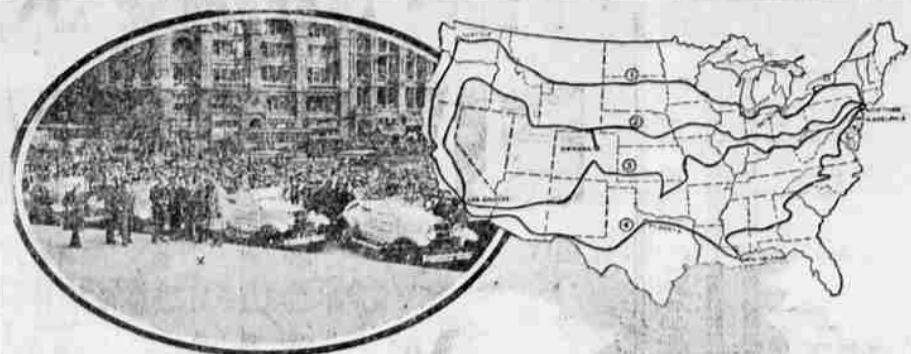
CHRISTIAN PASTOR IS AID TO CUPID

Good Will Studebaker Visits Medford Enroute Elks' Convention, Los Angeles

The route to Los Angeles, where the Elks' national convention will be held July 1 to 12, a striking purple and white Studebaker President Eight Roadster arrived in Medford Wednesday afternoon with Robert E. Clift of Chicago, western manager of the Elks' Magazine, at the wheel. The other passenger was H. C. Smith of Portland, representative of the U. S. Tire company, whose tires are being used in the long distance tour.

The car which stopped in this city yesterday is one of four Studebaker President Eight Roadsters, good-will tour from New York to Los Angeles. Each car started on a different route when the take-

off was made May 11. O. V. Myers, dealer for Studebakers, was among the local automobile men who welcomed the party and inspected the car.

Combining the purpose of advertising the national convention and testing the new Studebakers, the cars are welcomed wherever they stop by committees made up of Elks and dealers of the cars.

A delegation of Medford men, including Traffic Officer Herb C. Lennette, T. E. Daniels, W. H. McGowan and E. J. Carsten, met the good-will tour car at Gold Hill and escorted it into this city where it paraded the streets before going to the Elks' club at 4:30.

Since starting from New York May 11, the Studebaker President has been driven 4999 miles on the same U. S. tires with which it was equipped that day. Beebe & Kindel of this city and Central Point are dealers for U. S. tires.

The car which Abe Jenkins, famous endurance test driver, was using on his recent stop in Medford, is a stayer car to the Studebaker President. Mr. Jenkins met the Elks' car at Roseburg Wednesday. After leaving Medford the purple and white machine, was headed south, continuing the trip through the redwoods to Los Angeles.

CITY HALL WILL BE IMPROVED TO HOUSE OFFICERS

Following an inspection yesterday afternoon of the city hall building from which the fire department had removed the day before, by Mayor A. W. Pipes and Councilman J. J. Buchter, chairman of the council's building committee, that part of the structure that had been occupied by the fire department on both floors and the present city council chamber will be remodelled and refurnished at very little expense, mainly the removal of some partitions and installing of others, tearing out of stairways and covering holes, so as to make comfortable quarters for the police station and a larger and better ventilated council chamber than the present one.

The mayor, who was authorized at the last city council meeting to plan changes and see that they were completed, says the work will not be finished until about the last of next week although he put two men at work on the job today.

A large section of the northwest corner of the second floor will be partitioned off for a new council chamber, which will have frontage on Front street and 5th street, this affording fine ventilation and light.

The old rear stairway will be torn out and another room added on the second floor in its place, and various other small improvements will be made so as to make the interior of the building as attractive as the rear, and on the first floor in which the police station will be located, much more presentable and comfortable—all at very little expense.

The police station will not be moved from its present quarters until these changes are made in the city hall structure.

CO. AGENTS WARN CODLING MOTH IS DUE DURING JULY

There will be a rather heavy hatch of first brood codling moth worms during the first part of July. This holds true for all parts of the valley, as shown by moth traps under observation.

A third cover spray should be on by the first of July or as soon thereafter as possible. One gallon of light oil, plus two pounds of lead arsenate of lead, plus one-half pound spreader to the 100-gallons of water, is the best combination for wormy apple blocks. If oil is not used, spray with three pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to the 100 gallons of water.

Those who ordinarily apply only two cover sprays on pears should consider a third cover spray at this time. The cool weather during the past two weeks has delayed and the first brood so that worms will be more active than usual during July than in years past.

Spider mites are becoming active in several pear blocks. Unless the mites are present in numbers great enough to be readily found at the time this cover spray is being applied, it seems advisable to delay use of oil until the latter part of July, when the first cover spray for second brood worms will be due. Pear blocks should be closely watched, however, and an oil spray applied as soon as the mites become numerous.

Her statement said:

"The entire press will undoubtedly agree that I never have sought publicity. As it is in the past so it is today, people know more about my private affairs than I do myself.

"I wish to state that my engagement with his royal highness, Don Luis Ferdinand Marie Sacrasias Bourbon, is absolutely finished and I have nothing more to say on this subject, and I wish people would cease speaking and writing to me on this subject."

BRUSH FIRE SPREADS ON SAILING STREET

Just one truck answered the call and 100 gallons of chemicals extinguished the fire. It is thought that the blaze was started by someone attempting to burn brush on the lots, although no one was near to offer an explanation when the firemen arrived.
