## CALAMITY ENDS TRIP OF GROCER

### Tiny Boat in Which Lone Man Crossed Atlantic Is Burned in Storm—Owner Rescued By Island Resident—Wanted to Do Something Daring, Like Lindy—Money Needed.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 27.—(AP)—The beach at Kiawah island, 20 miles south of here, today held the battered and burned remains of the Aga, 18-foot boat in which Paul Muller, Berlin grocer, crossed the Atlantic alone.

Her skipper, safe here after a shipwreck and night of exposure, told the story of the disastrous end of his Hamburg-New York voyage.

Beating his way up the coast from Miami, where he first touched the American shore, Muller ran into storms off the South Carolina coast late Tuesday. A small struck the Aga, tore her sail to bits and tossed her on the rocky Kiawah shore.

"The Aga began to break up," said Muller. "So I decided to get her after as a signal for help. I poured what was left of my lamp's petrol over the decks and touched a match."

When no help came, he believed, he began swimming for John Island, seven miles away, where he could see a house. When he had covered part of the distance, Fritz Stroebel of Charleston, drawn by the fire from John Island, picked him up in a rowboat.

They made their way to Charleston. Muller is staying with Stroebel until he can make arrangements to continue to New York.

The grocer-seller was heartily looked at his voyage's unhappy ending. He told of a girl waiting for him in Berlin and of how he had hoped his daring would bring him enough money to marry her. Acathia Givinsky is her name.

"We are both poor people," Muller said.

## FAST PROGRESS MADE ON COOS COPCO LINE

Excellent progress is reported on the construction of the new Copco power line between Winchester and Coos Bay. Three crews are being worked, one out of Roseburg, another at Sitkum and one at Fairview. The Roseburg crew, which consists of 70 men, is contemplating the brushing out between Roseburg and Hebron, and has the work nearly finished. Materials are being delivered along the line so that installation will be commenced in the very near future. A crew of 80 men is camped at Sitkum and is also engaged in clearing the brush off the right of way. A survey crew is located at Fairview and is making the final location on the west end of the line. More than \$500,000 will be expended in the construction of this line, which will be an important factor in linking up the power service of Coos Bay with that of The California Oregon Power company.

## MRS. TOU VELLE'S KIN WINS HARVARD HONOR

At the Harvard University 253rd annual commencement last week, John DeWeese Blosser, of Chillicothe, Ohio, was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Laws, with honors, in recognition of his proficiency in academic work.

## CENTRAL POINT PROUD OF HEALTH CENTER BUILDING

Central Point is proud of her health center. The neat little shingled bungalow, pebble-dashed in green, with gray awning shaded windows, touched up with orange, is a happy spectacle that greets the eye of tourists as well as Jackson county residents as they travel the main street of Central Point.

The little house on the corner, with its sign "Central Point Health Center," extending out from one side, is the concrete expression of the finest work done in health work throughout that community by the Jackson county nurses and others employed in the services of the unit.

The interior of the building is bright and inviting, with its restful green tones—its border of pleatorially healthy children following each other around the four walls of the main room, in a series of happy games. The entrance room is divided off into three sections by means of partitions—the receiving room, the dressing room and the weighing and consultation room. A physician's room is separately equipped.

While baby clinics are held but once a month, Wednesday of each week is set aside as a conference day and a county health nurse will be stationed there on this day. Children in the schools who are underweight are being encouraged to come into the headquarters for regular weighing, and the health center through this, any many other activities has already taken a place in the community heretofore undreamed of.

## CLEVELAND PLANNING UNIQUE RUSTIC HOME

A three-room cabin, built of shingles and trimmed with peeled poles, a rustic bridge and a well with an "old oaken bucket" suspended above it. These are a few of the features of a home now being worked out by H. S. Cleveland, local designer and decorator, for his property on the Old Stage Road.

Mr. Cleveland designed this unique little home in keeping with the historical setting of the famous old trail, over which the stage coaches plied their course in pioneer days. To add to the quaint effect of the landscape, he is having the cabin built upon the side of the hill, with the back of the building higher than the front. The railing around the porch is to be made of peeled poles. A rustic log bridge will be built over a natural stream, which runs through the property. Other features of this type will be added as the home progresses.

## HIJACKERS SPEND SPURIOUS MONEY TO LAND IN JAIL

MACON, Ga., June 27.—(AP)—It appears that rackets don't mix successfully.

For instance, when a gang of Miami, Fla., bootleggers decided to hijack a Jacksonville rival, they neglected to find out whether the money they took from the lining of his coat was good or bad.

Consequently with secret service men, as well as prohibition agents on the trail, the result has been 10 arrests, five in Miami, three in Washington, D. C., and one each in Jacksonville and Macon.

W. M. Bolton of Georgia, 314, was under \$5000 bond for the federal grand jury here today after his plea of guilty before a United States commissioner on a charge of passing two worthless \$50 bills. He said a man in a Miami lunch stand gave him the bad money to buy liquor and that he came here and spent it instead.

George Brodmax, secret service operative, today was authorized by the statement that Jack Fields of Jacksonville was the man who was hijacked at Miami and had \$1750 worth of spurious bills taken from him. He since has been arrested and placed in jail at Jacksonville, the operative said.

Brodmax said all the bills were printed off a plate used by L. M. Hanna of Jacksonville in 1924. Hanna is serving a term in the United States prison at Atlanta for counterfeiting. The plate never has been found.

## WATERMELON SUPPLY OVERTOPS LAST YEAR

CHICAGO, June 27.—(AP)—Watermelons are being marketed now at the rate of a carload every minute and a half, day and night.

A report today from the government bureau of agricultural economics said the supply so far this season averaged two and a half times as large as a year ago. Taking the country as a whole, more than 1000 cars of melons daily have been shipped during the last week, the exact total being 7,300 cars.

Georgia and Texas furnished most of the melons.
