## FOURTH OF JULY FIREWORKS BAN IS SET BY CITY

Absent the nearness of the Fourth of July and that stands for the sale of fireworks and firecrackers are established just outside the city limits on the highways. Chief of Police McCredie and Fire Chief Elliott issue warning that as always during the Fourth of July period, the shooting of fireworks and other explosives, including fireworks, is not permitted inside the city limits, either on the great day, or before or after it.

This is pretty well understood by the youth of the city, as is attested by the fact that no Fourth of July noise has yet been heard in the city, beyond a few firecrackers shot off surreptitiously, and the shooting of toy cap pistols, which is permissible in the city.

The warm weather of the past week or more has greatly dried out vegetation in vacant lots and along curbs throughout the city, which makes it especially dangerous to shoot off explosives of any kind. As always in recent years, the sale of fireworks and firecrackers is not permitted in the city, but the noise-loving youths and some older folk get around this by purchasing such forbidden merchandise at the stands located outside the city limits.

Chief McCredie says the police will be especially vigilant in making arrests for violations of the anti-fireworks and firecracker ordinance.

## KINCAID TO CONDUCT DANCE AT GOLD HILL

Pending the trial in the circuit court, to test the validity of the new state law regulating dance halls, Luke Kincaid said today that he would conduct a dance at Gold Hill Saturday night, operating under a county license. Kincaid and E. R. White, president of the Jacksonville chamber of commerce, were recently indicted by a grand jury for operating a dance after 12 o'clock. A license was issued today.

Kincaid said that under the new order he would start earlier and close at midnight. His imperial orchestra will furnish the music.

## BOYISH PRANK COSTS LIFE OF COMPANION

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., June 28.—(AP)—A boyish prank of setting off a stick of dynamite cost the life of Red Eledge, 18, of Tucumari, N. M.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 28.—(AP)—Fire broke out early today in the research building of the Cleveland clinic hospital, adjoining the Cleveland clinic building, where 123 persons lost their lives in an explosion and fire May 15. So far as is known, no one was in the building at the time.

The fire was located in the electric paraffin bath of the physiotherapy department of the research building, which is separated by roadways both from the hospital and the clinic building, where the previous fire occurred.
