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EARWIG SURVEY FINISHED TODAY BY OATMAN MEN

The earwig survey made under the auspices of the county court and in charge of County Fruit Inspector Elmer E. Oatman, who has a local reputation for his work in this line, was completed this noon. This survey was begun last Monday morning and every section of the city was visited, though some few places may have been missed in various neighborhoods for various reasons.

A general, however, this survey was practically complete for the purpose for which it was made—to learn how much of a field, if any, the earwigs had obtained in the city. The survey developed the fact, according to Mr. Oatman this noon, that while many earwigs were found in various neighborhoods, the most were not as prevalent throughout the city as had been suspected before the survey was made.

The earwigs were found to be practically confined in certain neighborhoods. It is stated, and were not found generally throughout the city. For instance, no earwigs were found north of Main street.

To reinforce this survey, Mr. Oatman requests all citizens to do once report any suspicious destructive insects which may prove to be earwigs after they are found, to 195, county agent's office.

Now that the survey is completed, Mr. Oatman and his assistants in this survey destructive pesting will begin the work of poisoning or baiting the earwigs next week.

MEMORIAL OF FIRE SEEN AS FOREST AND GRASS DRIES

No fact has vegetation dried out in the rural sections throughout the county, outside of the forests in the high altitudes. That the forest has already assumed the usual burning proportions of late summer.

Two grass fires in the rural section in different localities caused much excitement yesterday in their respective neighborhoods, and together burned over 50 acres of grass and brush.

About 10 p. m. a grass fire in the desert section near Agate was reported at the forest office here and which had extended over 20 acres before being extinguished by several of the employees of the district fire warden's force. It was extinguished by last evening.

During the progress of this fire the smoke from it evidently drifted out towards Eagle Point, as five different Crater National forest lookouts phoned in to the forest headquarters here that they had "spotted" smoke from a fire near Eagle Point. An investigation was immediately made, but no fire could be found in the Eagle Point vicinity.

A fire which started accidentally yesterday forenoon in the grass at James Stewart's barn between Central Point and Tolo, and which after being extinguished, later broke out again, caused a great deal of damage to some of the crops and brush before it was extinguished for good in the afternoon.

Mr. Stewart has 120 stands of hay in this barn, and with others was burning a strip of grass between the two stands. When they thought they had it carefully out, and walked away a short distance, the flames broke out and began spreading. Again the fire was extinguished and some time later, while they were eating lunch at noon, flames broke out again and began spreading fast. The fire was finally put out for good.

Consequently a little damage was caused by the fire, and due to some early work at times, all the low stands were saved.

No forest fires were reported in the Crater National forest office yesterday and up until early this afternoon.
