

JAPANESE CABINET TOTTERS ON FALL

TOKYO, June 29.—(AP)—There was every indication today a sudden cabinet crisis, threatening the government of Baron Giichi Tanaka, has arisen. The trouble was understood to have its roots in the report of the investigation into the death of Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, defeated Chinese war lord, in Manchuria last June.

The leading mitter papers today freely asserted that the cabinet, formed from the seiyukai, or conservative party, in 1927 and reconstituted in 1928, was tottering and that the ministers, or liberal opposition was preparing to take over the reins of government.

VICTIM OF 'RIDE' IS FOUND IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—(AP) The body of an unidentified man, with a bullet hole in his left temple and his trousers weighed with bricks, was found early today in the Willamette river near the Sellwood bridge, Portland.

Harbor patrol officers believed the man was "taken for a ride" and are checking police records for missing persons in an effort to identify him.

The body had apparently been in the water ten days. There was 50 cents in change in the pockets. Unless he were left handed, police eliminated the suicide theory.

THIRD SON BORN JUGOSLAV QUEEN

BELGRADE, Jugo-Slavia, June 29.—(AP)—Queen Marie of Jugo-Slavia gave birth to a third son Friday at 11:49 p. m. at the summer palace at Bled. Her mother, Queen Marie of Romania, was at her bedside. Mother and son are doing well.

Announcement of the birth caused great rejoicing in the capital, where residents were particularly elated that it occurred on Saint Vlade's day, the country's national holiday.

Yesterday was also the anniversary of Jugo-Slavia's victory at Kossova, the day from which the existence of the united kingdom of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes dates.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., June 29.—(AP)—The luxury tax has proved such a burden to Bethlehem's movie and vaudeville theatres that the owners are appealing to public opinion for support of a downward revision. The theatre men even threaten to close their places if the present taxes are continued.

APIA, Samoa (AP)—A coconut diet was credited with having brought long life to Lapana, a native of Puka Puka who, has just celebrated his 100th birthday. Inquiry developed, however, that the old man had been a cannibal in his youth.

K. C. SECURES SIX CONVICTIONS FOR CANARD ON OATH

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—Members of the board of directors of the Knights of Columbus were informed today by Luke E. Hart of St. Louis, the order's supreme advocate, that six convictions already had been obtained in libel actions growing out of the circulation during and after the last presidential campaign on the bogus "Knights of Columbus oath."

Of those prosecuted, he said, why were Protestant ministers and two were women. No more cases are pending, he added, and no acquittals have resulted in any that have been tried.

Distributors of the "oath," he recalled, have been denounced by the committee of past grand masters of California which examined the Knights of Columbus ritual several years ago and found "neither the alleged oath nor any similar pledge." The spurious "oath" describes Protestants as "infamous heretics" and pledges "relentless war" against them and against all Masons.

CHICAGO PRIMA DONNA TO DIVORCE DIRECTOR

CHICAGO, June 29.—(AP)—Edith Mason, prima donna of the Chicago Civic Opera company, filed suit in circuit court yesterday to divorce Giorgio Polacco, director of the company. The bill, which was ordered suppressed, was filed just one day before their tenth wedding anniversary.

Miss Mason refused to comment. Maestro Polacco is 54 years old and Miss Mason 36. Their only child, Grace Edith, was born in the summer of 1925, with Mrs. Arthur Meeker acting as godmother. When the child was still an infant Polacco was reported as having insured his life for \$500,000 with the daughter as beneficiary.

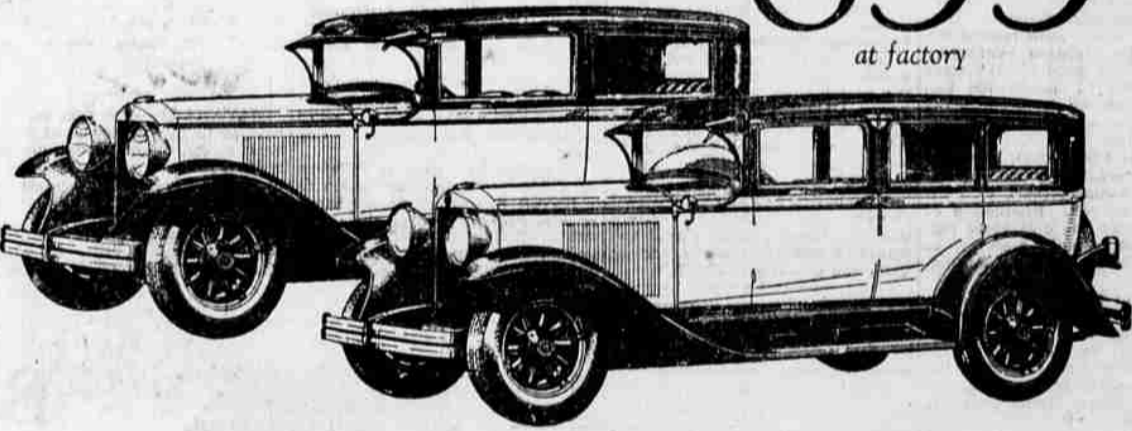

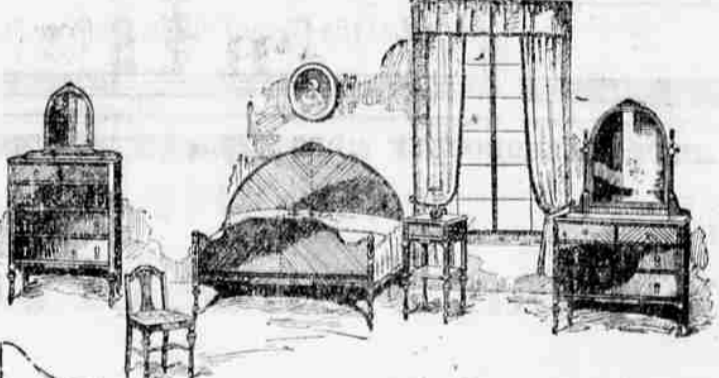
