Stanley G. Breininger To Be In Ashland

The director of the Ashland Art school, Miss Belle Cady White, considers herself very fortunate indeed to have secured Stanley G. Breininger of "The Breiningers," Santa Maria, Calif., as an instructor in her summer school at Ashland beginning July 8.

Mr. Breininger will teach two subjects, i. e., pictorial and decorative art. His proceedings will be in representation through self development and self expression. The course will include correct vision training, analysis of fundamental forms and stimulation through literature, music and action.

His proceedings will be practical so that teachers can make practical use of it in their work.

All will be clearly illustrated with examples from the work of students and professional artists.

In commercial art a series of problems in decorative drawing and color, through development of the principal features underlying the various phases of commercial art.

The course will cover modern lettering, psychological and emotional composition, and various types of technique in rendering.

There will be informal talks and notebook work offering problems suitable for use by teachers in the classroom that are applicable to school or civic use.

Each of the four instructors teach two courses, making eight in all, and any one pupil may carry four courses, thereby getting at least one course with each instructor.

Mr. Breininger has been a student of many schools and is a teacher of wide experience.

He graduated from New York School of Fine and Applied Arts, was a student at Pennsylvania museum, the School of Industrial Arts, Philadelphia, the Art Students League of New York, Commonwealth Art Colony, Rock Bay Harbor, Me., studied in Italy, France and England under many great masters, including Pavois and Chavannes.

As a teacher he formerly directed the Art Department of the State college, lecturer in University of Pittsburgh, gave a survey in England, France, Germany, U. S. A. and Czechoslovakia, attended art congress at Prague in 1928; was head of art department, Santa Maria, high and junior college, California, member of League of Arts, American Institute Educational Travel.

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LOCAL PEDAGOGUE MEDFORD FOLKS IS GIVEN MASTER TO SPEND FOURTH TEACHER HONORS IN OPEN SPACES

C. B. Thompson, agricultural instructor of the Medford high school, was elected Master Teacher of Oregon at the Smith-Hughes conference which closed Friday noon at the summer school of Oregon State college. This is the first time Oregon has chosen a Master Teacher, and as Mr. Thompson had scored in the agricultural department for a number of years, he was chosen by the other 28 Smith-Hughes instructors present. Oregon has not an yet made out the requirements for Master Teacher, but they will be presented at the next conference, and those teachers will be chosen according to these requirements. There is no work connected with the title, but merely honorary.

The Smith-Hughes conference which closed yesterday at noon, was reported to be very successful by C. B. Thompson, local instructor who attended. Out of 21 Smith-Hughes instructors in Oregon 29 were present, and the other two were in attendance at the conference conducted by the state of California, at Davis.

Smith-Hughes instruction includes three divisions: trade and industry, home economics, and agriculture.

H. A. Poard, formerly of Fort Collins, Colorado, was in charge of the conference, which was interrupted with the Oregon State summer school. Mr. Poard featured night schools and part-time schools, giving information, and help concerning them. O. I. Hanson, state supervisor of agriculture, also aided Mr. Poard.

Instruction was given every morning and afternoon, with conference from three to five, in charge of the different instructors. Mr. Thompson conducted one of these meetings. Various phases of the work, and ways of bettering conditions of teachers were discussed at these meetings.

According to H. A. Poard, agricultural teachers in Colorado are required to conduct either a part-time or night school, or their regular school work only takes half a day.

Mr. Thompson plans to conduct either a part-time or a night school during the school term this coming year. The night schools are conducted for adults, and the part-time schools for young men who have just completed high school, or do not get to go as far in educational lines.
