Agriculture is in no sense languishing in this country, but the agricultural people seem to be deprived of the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Agriculture is not languishing, but the agricultural people are languishing and unless agriculture itself is to languish, and thus begin the down grade of civilization which comes to every country where agriculture languishes, the agricultural people must awake to their responsibility. If the civilization of this country is to flourish, all of its people must prosper. All have a right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Many of our so-called "best citizens" believe that they must grab while the grabbing is good, and may the devil take the hindmost ones. Are the agricultural people willing and satisfied to be the hindmost ones in this game of grab? They surely will be unless they assert themselves in an organized way.
