

CARDS' STATUS PRECARIOUS AS LOSSES MOUNT

Drop Sixth Straight Contest When Southworth Extends Losing Streak—Cubs Retain Half Game Margin Over Pirates.

The situation of the Cardinals is becoming more alarming every day but at the current writing it appears that there is not even a situation in the American league the Athletics warring the Senators at will to maintain their already propitious lead.

The champions of John Heydler's circuit dropped their sixth straight yesterday when the ambitious Pirates won by 5 to 3 at Forbes field. The Cubs held the pace by shading the Reds in Chicago, 3 to 4 in eleven rounds. By way of focusing a bit of attention on the American league the Athletics slammed the Senators by 7 to 4 and 4 to 17 gaining half a game on the Yankees, who nosed out the Red Sox by 4 to 3 in 10 innings.

The defeat of the Cardinals ran Billy Southworth's losing streak to twelve games in the last fourteen. The Pirates annoyed the veteran Clarence Mitchell at intervals for six innings before descending upon him in the seventh for the two runs which provided the ultimate Pittsburgh margin.

The Cubs faltered against the Reds at Wrigley field yesterday, but rallied sharply in the late rounds and pulled out the decision in the eleventh.

By winning, the Cubs remained half a game ahead of the Pirates, and increased their margin over the Giants to four full contests. The New Yorkers took the first game of a double-header at Boston by 6 to 3 as Melvin Ott hit his twenty-third homer, but the Braves claimed the second, 2 to 2. The Phillies and the Robins got the afternoon off.

The Tigers slugged the Browns by 10 to 4, The Yankees, who climbed back into second place by a percentage margin, although virtually tied with the Browns. The Indians won two extra inning games from the White Sox in Cleveland, by 4 to 3 in ten innings and by 5 to 4 in eleven.

TILDEN DEFEATED BY FRENCHMAN IN ONE-SIDED FIGHT

WIMBLEDON, England, July 3.—(AP)—Henri Cochet of France defeated Bill Tilden in straight sets today in the semi-finals of the British tennis championships.

The little French marvel flattened his old rival from the United States in decisive fashion by scores of 6-4, 6-1, 7-5.

The victory was the most one-sided Cochet ever scored over Tilden.

Big Bill never threatened after the first set.

Tilden and Cochet fought a grim first set, games going to four-all with service. Then Tilden missed a wonderful chance. He was leading Cochet at 40-love in the ninth game, but the Frenchman pulled lever and won the game, going into the lead at 6-4.

Tilden started the next game with a double fault, the game went to deuce and finally the Frenchman broke through the American's service and won the set.

King Alfonso of Spain arrived at the stadium to start.

Cochet ran the score to 5-love before Tilden got his only game in the second set. And he captured that only after a long struggle for advantage point. Henri then ran out the set.

HERR MAX MUST FIGHT ENGLISH HEAVYWEIGHT

Latest Government Pear Crop Report Shows 58% of Normal Annual Yield Expected for U. S.; 55% in California

Below is listed the last government report for the estimated pear yield for the United States for 1929. In Washington and Oregon, where the number of pear trees of bearing age, has been increasing rapidly, the production will no doubt run close to the average of the past few years.

From present indications the California pear estimate will be revised in July to 6,255,000 bushels.

In summarizing this report, the American Fruit Growers, Inc., notes that the large producing states of California and New York both expect light crops. The condition of the pear crop is estimated at 58 per cent of normal, as compared with 70 per cent of last year, and an average of 65 per cent during the previous 10 years. The table below shows the estimated output, and also the actual production of last year.

LAUNCHING OF BIG BOAT AT LAKE IS EXCITING FEATURE

CHATER LAKE, Ore., July 2.—(Special)—Scores of lake visitors crowded a low point of the rim one-half mile from the lodge yesterday to watch the breath-taking feat of lowering to the water's edge of the new 40-passenger, two-ton launch.
